

A few years ago, when I was working in a youth retreat centre, I travelled by train to say Mass there. An elderly woman was sitting opposite me, and she asked where I was going. I told her all about the retreat centre and that I was a Catholic priest who worked there. When she discovered I worked with young people, she went on a rant about how awful modern youth were, and asked if I agreed. "Not at all," I replied, "I think young people are fantastic."

At the end of the Easter Vigil in Walsingham this year, which I celebrated with Student Cross, I had the same thought. The Catholic parish church was filled with people joyfully celebrating the Lord's Resurrection, so enjoying the celebration that the music group had to play three or four recessional hymns! The congregation mostly consisted of young people who had given a week of their lives to walk Student Cross, in order to have a very special experience of Christian community for Holy Week and Easter.

Student Cross is a pilgrimage which involves around three hundred people now, many of them young people, who walk from several cities around England and all converge on Walsingham to celebrate Easter. Most groups walk about 120 miles, carrying a heavy wooden cross and sleeping on village or church hall floors along the way. They set off on the Saturday before Palm Sunday and arrive on Good Friday afternoon in Walsingham before celebrating the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion and the Easter Vigil, and joining the community at the Anglican Shrine for their Easter Eucharist.

During the week, each group (or 'leg' as they get called) celebrates its own liturgy, with morning and evening prayers each day, as well as Mass several times in the week. They eat and pray, walk and sleep together, often relaxing in the evenings over a glass of beer, singing songs and getting to know each other.

For many of the people who walk, it's the most intense experience of Christian community that they ever have. Each leg naturally grows very close, and the support and concern shown to each other is a wonderful part of the week. At each stop, the walkers make a Station of the Cross, with time for a reflection given by one of the people in the group. These can be light, but they are often tremendously profound and occasionally about the most difficult and painful things which are happening in that person's life. It's part of the trust and love that develops that people feel able to share their burdens with the others.

Because each leg takes very nearly the same route every year, we develop relationships with the people along the way. Some will come to the bottom of their gardens to smile and wave as we go by. One old woman knelt as we went by and called after us, "What you're doing is very important!" Some invite us in for a cup of tea and to use their loo. Some come to listen to us sing in the pubs where we gather in the evenings. And of course, some shout and jeer, though they're in the distinct minority.

All this is to say that Student Cross is a little slice, a brief experience, of the kind of Christian community that every parish is called to be, a group of people who pray and support each other in our Christian faith but who are also a sign to the world around us, calling people to faith and love, or even, in some, prompting that rejection which Christ told us his followers would experience.

One man last year drove past the leg with which I walk (Northern Leg, who begin walking in Nottingham) and shouted "Tree-huggers!" Well, I'm very proud to be a tree-hugger, if the tree in question is the Cross of Christ. As the prayer my leg say on taking up the cross each day reminds us, we should glory in nothing else.


