Why the Church prefers burial

D r Johnson famously said that the only certain things in life are death and taxes. About taxes, Mother Church claims no special competence, beyond saying that we must pay them (Rom. 13:7), unless they are manifestly unjust. But about death, she does have quite a lot to say; which is hardly surprising, since death is for each of us the beginning of our eternity.

What happens to the soul after death, of course, is far more important than what happens to the body. Heaven, hell, purgatory; these things are far beyond our comprehension. Yet we can dimly imagine them, and in so doing we perhaps feel that in comparison to the destination of the soul after death, all other questions fade into insignificance.

Nevertheless, by God's will the human body too has its proper value in the scheme of things, even after the person has died. Don't we all instinctively feel it to be so? There is no society on earth in which the dead body is not treated with some ceremonies of reverence. Even when the soul has departed, the body retains a trace of the divine image which God breathed into the face of Adam on the day of his creation. What's more, the body of the Christian was made a temple of the Holy Spirit in baptism, and those who are faithful unto death will rise again gloriously on the last day.

All this perhaps helps us see why the Church is not neutral between the options of burial and cremation. This is what she says: 'The Church strenuously recommends that the devout custom of burying the bodies of the departed be preserved' (Code of Canon Law, no. 1176:3). She sees it as particularly suited to the dignity of the human body, and a vivid way of expressing our faith in the resurrection.

It's also worth remembering that when the deceased Christian is buried, he is in that sense conformed to Christ. Our Lord chose to lie in the tomb. Likewise, tradition tells us, the Blessed Virgin was also placed in a tomb before her assumption, body and soul, into heaven.

Unfortunately, in our complex modern society, funerals are often expensive affairs, and burials can be particularly so. Perhaps a new Catholic charity could be formed, to respond to this problem. In the meantime, the English Dominicans have some funds available set aside for those who come to our churches and are in financial straits. Preserving the ancient Christian custom of burial would certainly count as a good use of these funds. 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time
