SAINT THOMAS AQUINAS

ast Wednesday, 28th January, was the feast day of St Thomas Aquinas. He is one of the most distinguished members of the Dominican Order, so it seems right to devote this Back Page to him.

He was born about 1225, in Italy, of a family that had links with many of the chief houses of Europe. His parents intended that he would become a leading churchman, and when he was five years old they sent him to be educated at the Benedictine monastery of Monte Cassino, not far from his home. He remained there until he was about 15, when he went to Naples to study liberal arts at the university. He was noted as a very promising pupil; and around the age of 20 he decided to join the recently established Dominican Order. His family fiercely opposed this, since they had envisaged a career for him in the respectable Benedictine Order. His elder brothers literally kidnapped him and imprisoned him in the family castle of Roccsecca for about a year. But they could not break his resolve. Eventually he managed to escape and return to the Dominicans, who sent him first to Rome and then to Paris, and finally to Cologne, where he studied under the famous St Albert the Great.

His life after this was a continuous round of study, teaching and writing. He moved between the main Dominican centres: Paris, Rome and Naples, and was constantly in demand to deal with theological and philosophical issues of the day. He reorganised the studies of the Order, and answered questions which came to him from all directions, from Popes to the humblest Dominican brother. The intensity of his work was possibly unique as a human achievement. He was said to have dictated three different books simultaneously to three different scribes. Small wonder that at the age of 49 he was exhausted. At this point he had an experience at Mass that made him say: 'such things have been revealed to me that all I have taught and written seems quite trivial to me now'. He stopped writing, leaving his major work, the *Summa Theologica* unfinished. Three months later he died, while travelling to take part in the Council of Lyons.

What does he say to us in the 21st century? First, he was a man of prayer, so that he was always and constantly conscious of God being present with him, and in everything. And in that respect, we can all try to follow him, always. But second, we live in a culture which effectively says: 'We have science, so we don't need God', as though God is simply the explanation of why things are. St Thomas, and the great catholic tradition, says: 'God is; and that is why there is everything else'. St Thomas' thinking and his prayer are therefore completely united, as ours can be too.
