Christ is tempted in the desert

oday's short Gospel sums up the whole of Christ's mission. The Jews expected a final battle in which God's goodness would triumph over evil. Jesus came to fulfil those expectations. Christ's conflict with every form of evil is one of the central themes in Mark's Gospel. This battle would reach its climax on the cross. Jesus first joined battle with evil when He was tempted in the desert. In this conflict Jesus and Satan are the protagonists for good and evil. Jesus, we are told, was tempted or tested.

Unlike Matthew and Luke, Mark doesn't tell us the nature of Christ's temptations. But we can assume that His commitment to obeying His Father's will was sorely tested. He would have been offered plausible alternatives, soft options and easy escapes. Satan wanted to deflect Him from carrying out His painful, difficult mission. For Jesus, these temptations were very real. He was not play-acting. But as He resisted these seductive temptations Jesus won the first round in His battle against evil.

By confronting temptations Jesus identified with us in our struggle against sin. If sin didn't seem attractive, temptations would cause us no problem. It's only too easy for us to find plausible reasons for doing what deep down we know is wrong what we would readily condemn in others. There's so much to deflect us from doing what is demanding but right, or to choose what is easy but wrong. Life can seem a constant battleground in which we are torn between good and evil.

The same was true for Christ. That's very reassuring, since it reminds us that being tempted is very different from sinning. As with Christ, temptations test our commitment to God's will. They help us to focus on what is really important and shun what would be a distraction. With each victory over temptation our wills are strengthened and we are better prepared for the next battle.

But sometimes we do fail the test and yield to the temptation to sin. So today's Gospel concludes by urging us to repent — to have a change of heart and behaviour as we seek God's forgiveness. Through the wonder of His mercy, He puts our sins behind Him and us. When we've fallen, He gets us back onto our feet. With His help we can make a fresh start — that's the wonder of the Good News Jesus has given us. With Him on our side there's hope for even the greatest sinner!

Lent is a special time of grace, in which we should be especially anxious to join Christ in His battle against evil. With Him we focus on what is really important in our lives, and try to eliminate whatever undermines our commitment to God. When the forces of evil seem to be overwhelming us let us remember that we are not fighting the battle alone. With Almighty God on our side Satan doesn't stand a chance — providing we seek God's help, and don't try to fight His battles without His support. But if we take unnecessary risks and play with fire we should expect to get burnt. Life is difficult enough without making it harder! First Sunday of Lent
