

## On Apostolic foundations

This week we celebrate the feast of Saints Peter and Paul, yoking together two quite disparate characters. Peter, despite his foibles and failings was one of the first companions of Jesus, accompanying him (with the occasional wobble) to the end, and beyond. Paul came late to the nascent Christian movement, describing himself as like one born out of time. Both had different missions: Peter centrally, among the core of disciples who followed Jesus, Paul more adventurously reaching out to new peoples.

The church in Rome known by Peter and Paul would have been a loose collection of independent assemblies, each with its own leaders. Yet as time went on this loose confederation thought of itself as one church, based on the special status of Peter in the gospels, as they believed themselves to perpetuate the responsibilities and privileges of the Apostle. The church of Rome then, from very early times, took on the role of primary witness and guardian of the faith to the wider Christian commonwealth. According to the evangelists, especially Matthew and John, Peter's role is central among the apostles. Still, his was not the only voice. While Paul recognises Peter's special place among the apostles, and his role in the mission to the Jews outside Palestine terminating in Rome, Paul vigorously defends his own mission to the gentiles, even to "withstanding Peter to his face" in Antioch.

The habit of appealing to the bishop of Rome in doctrinal disputes came from his status as head of a community that had inherited both the teaching and the ultimate act of witness – martyrdom – of the princes of the apostles. The Roman church then became the point of reference for Christians elsewhere, based on the combined authority, uniquely, of two apostles: Peter, to whom the commissions to bind and to feed had been given by Christ himself; and Paul, charismatic preacher of a gospel received direct from God. This enhanced status with respect to the other apostolic sees – Jerusalem, Antioch, Alexandria and later Constantinople – was one of degree, not of kind; although following the vicissitudes of history the church of Rome alone survived in Christian Europe.

At the Reformation many Christian groups broke communion with the church of Rome, but as time went on many even in the reformed traditions still look to the Roman church as a standard of orthodoxy. In the last decade or so we have seen the churches increasingly coming together in the face of persecution and against the pressures of a secularising society. Perhaps the most pressing problem of authority faced now by the church of Rome is how to help other churches rediscover their own dignity and authority, in a revived Christian commonwealth?

**Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.** Adoration is a very important way of preparing for Mass and of deepening our understanding of the Mass. It takes place at Holy Cross on Sundays from 6.00-7.00 pm, on Wednesdays from 11.00am and on Saturdays from 10.30am.

**Collection of goods for Refugees and Asylum Seekers.** Very many thanks to all of you who have donated to our collection of goods for asylum seekers and refugees. We have regularly taken very large amounts of goods to them, sometimes filling not just the boot but the whole passenger compartment of a car! However it is only worth giving goods that are going to be of immediate practical assistance to a person: mainly food (non perishable of course), toiletries, baby clothes and requirements. Adult clothing is not so important and if given should be nearly new and in excellent condition; otherwise it will have to be thrown away – you would be better to give it to a charity shop run by one of the well known agencies. Domestic equipment such as crockery, pots and pans is acceptable if new or nearly new. **Electrical equipment should not be given.** It is tempting to think that because you have no need for something it should be donated, but we ask you to consider carefully whether asylum seekers and refugees will be able to use it. We are having to reject quite a few things and it would help us if you would bear this in mind.

**The LeicesterShire Historic Churches Trust** was formed in 1964, and is an independent charity. Its trustees (which include Fr Fabian) and helpers are volunteers. The majority of the Trust's income comes from legacies and the annual Ride+Stride which, since 1989, has raised more than £800,000 for historic churches in the City and County (and Holy Cross has been a beneficiary). This year's Ride and Stride day is **Saturday 12 September** and, nearer the time, there will be information on how you can participate.

The Parish shop is open after the 12.30pm Masses during the week, on Saturdays from 11am until after the 12.30pm Mass, and after every Sunday Mass. The shop is in the room beyond the sacristy.
