

Can't stand the heat

These last few days have cheered us up with the long awaited heatwave. It is very pleasant to see so many people out enjoying the good weather and making the most of the broad summer days. But these things come with a price. The heat can become overpowering, and so the radio issues reminders that people should drink plenty of water, cover their heads, and take all kind of measures to stay cool. The symptoms of sunstroke are rehearsed, and we are reminded to be vigilant for the sake of vulnerable people who may suffer the effects of the intense heat.

Not being used to such weather, many of us find the heat oppressive. Isn't it ironic that we wait all year for such good days and then bemoan them when they arrive? Some of us will even travel many miles to catch the sun, but when it comes to us, we can't cope with it. Our ordinary clothes, environments, and working routines become disrupted as we are overcome by the temperature. We are forced to take a step back – to rest a little, taking the time and the appropriate measures to adjust to the balmy conditions.

The heat never lasts for very long, and the summers on these islands are the subject of many jokes. But the heatwave can come as a timely reminder about stepping back, taking care, and examining our lives. Schools and other organisations move into summer mode, where the ordinary routines are broken and there is a time of stepping back. Our airports and roads become busy with people getting away from it all for a while. These things are very important. We need to recharge. Sometimes the grace of God turns up the temperature for us all a little. Sometimes God calls us into a balmy experience of his mercy, where we are slightly overcome and we feel unable to continue what we feel is our normal routine. In such times, we have an opportunity to feel loved by God, and realise the extent of our dependence upon him. Prayer, being an experience of God's presence, is something we long for, but it can so easily become something we regard as a chore or a burden. In these times, prayer has become something we use to oppress ourselves. We want to control it for the feel good factor, rather than experience the liberation of abandoning ourselves to God's mercy and allowing Christ to pray in us.

Stepping back for a while, feeling overcome, allows us to consider again how much we need times of authentic prayer to experience God's love. As we prepare to take our summer break, in whatever form that comes, let's all be reminded to take stock once more of our need for God's presence in our prayer.


Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Adoration is a very important way of preparing for Mass and of deepening our understanding of the Mass. It takes place at Holy Cross on Sundays from 6.00-7.00 pm, on Wednesdays from 11.00am and on Saturdays from 10.30am.

Fr Bruno's Challenge. After months of hard training, Fr Bruno set off at midnight on Saturday for his 110-km Ultra-marathon Challenge in the Lake District. Following a strong start, and having covered 4 mountains and achieved 56km in nine hours, he was unfortunately forced by injury to retire soon after 9am. Fr Bruno ran just over half of the total distance, the equivalent of one and a third full-size normal marathons, and did so over a difficult Lake District terrain.

In pitch black, with only a head torch lighting his way, Fr Bruno made it to the first check point in one and a half hours – excellent timing. But soon after the check point, he encountered problems. He descended a deep valley, followed by a hugely steep ascent and an equally steep descent on the other side. Poor visibility caused him to trip, leading to the tendon injury that forced him to stop. We should report that only 190 out of the 414 participants managed to finish the Ultra-marathon. 'If it wasn't for my injury', Fr Bruno said, 'I would have finished it'. Then he added, 'that's why I'm planning to run it again next year.

Br Samuel Burke, on behalf of the Dominican student brothers, thanked Fr Bruno for his valiant efforts in raising over £3,600 for the Dominican Friars Training Fund, by saying: 'Last year three brothers and I raised funds for the Training Fund by walking from one side of the country to the other on our Coast-to-Coast trail. This year Fr. Bruno valiantly picked up the gauntlet in choosing to run across the same challenging Lake District terrain where we had but walked last year. Our deepest thanks go to Fr Bruno for his efforts, and to the generous benefactors that contributed to support the training fund.'
