

Walking in the Light

The Baptism of the Lord is one of a cluster of feasts round the great celebration of the Incarnation, which we celebrate on Christmas day, along with the Holy Family; Holy Mary, Mother of God; the Epiphany; and the Holy Name of Jesus (Circumcision, formerly). All of them help us to grasp something of the meaning of the Incarnation, of who Jesus is, God-with-us, Emmanuel. We might think of them as like shining light through a prism – white light is split into the colours of the rainbow, and put through another prism, becomes white again – which help us grasp the different shades, aspects or meanings of the Incarnation. The Baptism of the Lord closes the Octave or 8-day celebration of the Epiphany, and it is worth considering this aspect a little.

‘Epiphany’ literally means ‘shining forth’ – the kind of description that might have been applied to the light shining from the Pharos, great lighthouse of Alexandria, by storm-tossed sailors on a dark sea. This picks up a familiar image from the prologue of John’s gospel we read on Christmas morning: the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overpower it. It is God’s life, light and love breaking in to the darkness of our world, of ourselves: the darkness of our confused and mixed motives for what we do or fail to do, the darkness of our hurts and shame, the darkness of our failures in loving – either too little, or too much, too possessively. In the Incarnation of the Word, the world is irrevocably illuminated by the glory of God.

The glory of God, St Irenaeus of Lyons told us back around 180, is a human being fully alive, set free to love, loving and lovable; empowered by God’s Spirit to reflect and transmit God’s mercy and compassion, bring God’s light into the darkness of our world. In this present life we are as it were groping our way in the darkness before dawn. But in that darkness the day is heralded by the morning star, we stand in the words of an ancient prayer ‘ante luciferam’, before the light-bearer. Ancient and modern metaphors coincide here: the light of the sun reflected off the planet Venus (the ancients’ morning and evening star) anticipates the sun’s rising, the new day.

We are called then to be bearers of light, lucifers. Enlightened and empowered by God’s Spirit we are to be the vessels bearing his love and compassion into the dark places of our world. Pope Francis encourages us to see this year of mercy as God’s favourable time, the time when we are invited to engage again with that mission. Taking God’s healing into the world implies that we first seek that healing ourselves: through becoming reconciled with God we become empowered to take the risk of loving others, to reach out – forgiving or accepting forgiveness – without fear of being rebuffed or ridiculed. We are to mirror God’s light, even if at this time only as through a glass, darkly. Let your light shine!

Appeal for Refugees & Asylum Seekers. Refugees and Asylum Seekers remain in urgent need of food donations to respond to the emergency needs of destitute asylum seekers and refugees in Leicester. The full list of items needed to support these destitute and vulnerable people is:

- ◆ Tinned goods: tomatoes/ kidney beans/ chick peas/ tuna/ mackerel/ corned beef/ tinned fruit/ tinned vegetables/ baked beans/ soup;
- ◆ Dried foods: rice/ maize meal/ lentils/ cous cous/ dried fruit/ noodles/ sugar/ porridge/ flour/ pasta;
- ◆ Long life goods: cooking oil/ cereal bars/ nuts/ cereal/ crisps/ indian savoury mix/ chocolate/ biscuits;
- ◆ Drinks: fruit juice/ tea/ coffee/ drinking chocolate/ dried milk/ long-life milk/ squash/ water;
- ◆ Toiletries: toothpaste/ toothbrushes/ soap/ toilet paper/ shampoo/ sanitary towels/ face and body creams/ shaving equipment;
- ◆ Baby items: nappies/ baby wipes/ oil/ baby milk/ baby food jars/ baby bath liquid;
- ◆ Also: tin openers/ cutlery/ crockery/ pans/ towels/ sleeping bags/ t-shirts/ supermarket and other shopping vouchers/ mobile telephone top-up vouchers/ writing paper/ envelopes/ stamps.
