Call and Response

oday's 1st Reading and Gospel have a common theme – God's call and man's response. First, there's Isaiah – a court of officials; then, in the Gospel, there's the apostles – a group of fishermen. The circumstances of their call were very different. While Isaiah was praying in the temple he received an overwhelming sense of the awesome, majestic holiness of God in His heavenly court. Instinctively, Isaiah a felt a sense of great unworthiness; he was unfit for God's presence. But after God's angel had touched and purified his lips Isaiah felt able to volunteer to be the Lord's messenger. He realised that when God asks us to do a job He owes it to Himself and us to give us the strength to carry out His will.

That was the case in today's Gospel, when Jesus chose the apostles. He'd just shown them a sign of His power and majesty — when He enabled them to make a miraculous catch of fish. But, like Isaiah, they were overcome by a great sense of unworthiness. Peter exclaimed, *"leave me, Lord. I am a sinful man!"* But, instead of going, Jesus, reassured Peter and His companions. *"Do not be afraid,"* He said; *"from now on it will be men you will catch."* So they left everything and followed Jesus. Like the prophet Isaiah, they realised that the Lord's power and majesty, which at first had terrified them, would give them strength, not destroy them. With God on their side they could do whatever He asked of them.

And that is true for us, as it was for Isaiah and the apostles. To each one of us Jesus says, "*Follow me*." God needs you and me — all of us; He's got something special for each of us to do. That will usually be within the circumstances we already find ourselves. Though we may not have to leave everything, God will expect total commitment from us, often requiring peersonal sacrifices of us; we can't just be part time, Sunday Christians.

But unlike Isaiah and the apostles, God usually doesn't reassure us with a demonstration of His power and majesty. Instead, Jesus has promised to be with us always. When, at our baptisms and confirmation, we were commissioned to share the faith we had received. The Spirit of the Lord came upon us, enabling us do the job He has given us. In general we've all been called to witness to our hope in the Good News of salvation, which Jesus has given us. Challenged to sum up that hope, what would you say? Pope Francis has given us the answer - compassionate, loving mercy. Mercy, he tells us, is the 'face of God;' mercy must be the face of us, His children, whom He has made in His own image and likeness. On Wednesday we will begin Lent. During this holy season we will prepare to enter into the spirit of the most profound expression of God's saving love and mercy, through the death and resurrection of His Son. To live the Good News of God's saving mercy we must seek forgiveness and show mercy. During this Year of Mercy let's resolve to make a special Lenten effort to be the human face of God's mercy - to be peacemakers that was Christ's mission; that's what it must mean for us to answer Christ's call to follow Him.
