THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE 22ST SUNDAY

1ST READING: ECCLESIASTICUS 3:19-21,30-31.

The sage reminds us that humility before God and our neighbour is both a pleasing thing and a sensible one too.

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2ND READING: HEBREWS 12:18-19, 22-24

St Paul presents us with a beautiful, poetic description of heaven, and teaches us that the beatific vision is the enjoyment of God himself, in communion with all the redeemed.

GOSPEL READING: LUKE 14:1,7-14.

Taking up the theme of the first reading, Our Lord emphasizes the both the necessity and wisdom of humility. He also teaches that a generous heart should be part of the Christian's make up.

DOMINICAN RITE MASS, XV SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

EPISTLE: GALATIANS 5:25-26; 6:1-10

St Paul teaches that humility is necessary to avoid vainglory, and that we are called to bear one another's burdens.

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GOSPEL: Luke 7:11-16

The Lord's miracle of raising the widow's son is a foretaste of the final resurrection, when our bodies and souls will be reunited in the great judgement.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

A DOMINICAN ROAD MAP – A LIFE OF PRAYER

Fr David continues his series of reflections on the Dominican way of life, inspired by the 800th Jubilee of our Order and the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

It is said of St Dominic that he spoke only “to God or of God”. By this, we can know that those who engaged with St Dominic in the course of his life could recognise that he had attained a relationship with God that meant he was constantly aware of God’s presence and holiness in every aspect of his life. His whole life was unified by his communication with God in prayer, which he communicated to others. St Thomas Aquinas put it quite succinctly when he said that the vocation of the Dominican Preacher is ‘to contemplate, and to bring to others the fruit of that contemplation.’

These images are very important and enriching for those who wish to follow the Dominican way. We are not called to find out clever facts and explain them to others. We are not called to search for profound insights and repeat them to others. This would be in many ways easy, and it does of course mark some of our task as preachers. We can share the spiritual and intellectual achievement of others, and rejoice in it, but it is worth so much more if we can ourselves possess it. The Dominican preacher has not done his work unless others are changed by his preaching. This can only happen if he is constantly changed by prayerful encounter with God.

The most important work of the Dominican Community is the observance of the Divine Office, the Prayer of the Church. Each Dominican is privileged to pray in the common celebration of the Office, several times each day, as provided by the Liturgy of the Church and at times appointed by the Priory Chapter. At these times, the Dominican Community gathers to sing the psalms and read the Scriptures. It is also known as the ‘Liturgy of the Hours’, because it sanctifies the different moments of the day. Each time the Dominican Community gathers to pray an hour of the Office, their ordinary work is transformed into a spiritual work – in every sense a divine office, something obliged of the preacher for prayerful transformation. The Dominican Community is united in this prayerful action, and seeks closer communion with God and with one another for the sacred work of preaching.

The breaking of a work pattern to share in these moments of community prayer sanctifies the Dominican’s daily routine. It also inspires within the individual preacher a desire to sanctify every moment of his living. The joyfulness of prayerful encounter with God is something that can be truly possessed by those who seek to contemplate the love of God through constant careful and prayerful attention to his presence in our lives. Engaging in such a sacred encounter will demand of the Dominican the act of charity which is preaching – the sharing with others these sacred fruits, through a holy way of life and the joyful expression of mercy.

What a wonderful opportunity we have to follow the example of St Dominic, and to speak only to God or of God! If we are able to attain to this, we can live a life that is totally transformed. Our appreciation of the beauty of creation and our own blessed calling within God’s design becomes more profound. Our desire to seek God’s salvation and to share his love with others becomes our motivation. Our love of God will grow because we will realise the extent to which he desires to be close to us. To be true preachers of grace, we must be people of prayer. Our opportunity to encounter God in this way is the privileged calling of the Dominican.
