THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

1ST READING: ISAIAH 7:10-14

Biblical names often contain huge clues as to the character of the person who bears them. In this case, the maiden's son is to have the title, "Immanuel", "God-with-us". A very clear prophecy of the Incarnation. In the fullness of time, he is given the personal name "Jesus", which means "God saves".

2ND READING: ROMANS 1:1-7

Here St Paul preaches the full humanity and the divinity of Christ. From this flows his apostolic mission and that apostolic mission has been continued down through the centuries in the Church. Here we can also see that Rome is already coming to the fore as the earthly centre of Christianity.

GOSPEL READING: MATTHEW 1:18-24

Here St Matthew links up the prophecy of Isaiah with the birth of Christ. The Annunciation to St Joseph emphasises his character as a just man who is to be set over the little household of God; Jesus, Mary and Joseph. We invoke his prayers for all men, fathers, and for the well-being of God's great household, which is the Church.

EPISTLE: PHILIPPIANS 4:1-5

St Paul gives a concise definition of the role of the apostles, and by extension all those called to the priesthood, and to all Christians in general. "Stewards of the Mysteries of God." We are given the Sacraments and doctrine of the Church in stewardship, not to do with as we please. It is this stewardship which will be examined at the end of time.

GOSPEL: LUKE 3:1-6

St Luke is very careful to place the appearance of our Lord in public at a very specific time, just as he does for the nativity of the Lord. The Incarnation is the central event in human history until the Second Coming of Christ, when the creation will be consummated and the final resurrection comes to pass.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

4TH WEEK OF ADVENT – THE COMING OF OUR GOD

During the Season of Advent, Fr Fabian reflects on the meaning of this special time, and the readings we hear at Mass.

On Christmas Eve, half an hour before our Midnight Mass starts, we have a service of readings and carols in this Church, to lead us into the Christmas celebrations. This service begins with what is called the Christmas Praeconium, an ancient chant, sung by one cantor, telling of the moment in history when our Saviour was born. First, it gives the date of the birth of Christ, counting from the creation of the world according to the Biblical dating. Then it gives the date of Christmas counting from important Biblical events: from the Flood, from the birth of Abraham, from the Exodus, from the anointing of David as King, and from the prophecy of Daniel. Then it gives the date of his birth in relation to civil events: how long it has been since the first Greek Olympiad, how long since the founding of the city of Rome; and how long since the accession of the reigning Roman Emperor, Octavian Augustus. And finally, it reaches its climax: 'In the sixth age of the world, when the whole world was at peace, Jesus Christ, eternal God and Son of the eternal Father was born at Bethlehem in Judah, of the Virgin Mary'.

It is a dramatic moment, made more dramatic by the singer raising the pitch by a fifth for the final words, describing the actual birth of Jesus. It is a memorable start to our annual celebration of Christmas.

Because the words of this chant are very ancient, some of the dates are no longer accepted. For example, we now think that the world began much more than 5,199 years before the birth of Christ. But precise dating is not important. What is being said is that the birth of Jesus was a real happening. Christmas does not simply commemorate a virtue or value or gift – like the Hindu 'Diwali', the 'festival of light'. The birth of Jesus was a real human birth, which took place in the real material world, which it shares with other historical events such as those mentioned, the ancient Greek Olympic Games, and the founding of the city of Rome. Moreover, in contrast to much earlier history, it was a time of peace, not perhaps of total absence of conflict everywhere, but certainly a time when the Roman Emperor Augustus no longer had rivals; so, the Roman Empire was at peace within itself and in its relations with the rest of the world. It was appropriate that the Prince of Peace should be born into a peaceful world.

In contrast, our present-day society tends to reduce Christmas to fanciful stories, not recognising it as an historical event. For example, Santa Claus, Rudolf the Red-Nosed Reindeer, and the Twelve Days of Christmas, feature very obviously in current Christmas decorations, Christmas Cards and so on. But no one really thinks that these are, or were, real people, animals or events – even though Santa Claus is based on the very real Saint Nicholas, who is celebrated on 6 December. So, it is good to see that the Christmas Crib continues to be well displayed in Leicester's Town Hall Square. You could hardly have a more vivid statement that Christmas is about something that really happened.

But of course, though the birth of Christ was an historical event, it was quite unlike any other historical event. First, it was unique. God could only become man once. Second, could there be any other happening which brought together God and his creatures so closely as this? Could there be any other event which affirmed so clearly the value of the material creation and of human beings within it? Could there be any other way in which we can learn so much about God himself – his love, his compassion, his mercy, his power and his wisdom?

These may be some of the thoughts that fill our hearts and minds when we celebrate Christmas this year, when we kneel before the crib, when we pray that Jesus will make his home with us and bring peace, mercy and holiness into our lives and into his world, the world he came into, to bring it his peace.'
