W E come to Mass to know Jesus, listen to Him, learn to talk to Him in prayer, and receive Him into our lives, completely, in Holy Communion.

Many think they don't need this They've 'got the idea', 'know Jesus', find Mass boring.

It isn't. The gospels aren't boring. If we really listen to them, they become mysterious.

Today's gospel — miracles? They don't happen now. If they did, the newspapers would be full of them. Oh, yes, they happened around Jesus? They don't happen around us.

Unless we see miracles of a different kind now - in all the 'tender and loving care' given by thousands of nurses, doctors, chaplains, and others, to the sick and weak, often in His name, always by His example.

We could see such miracles happening now in ourselves. 'The blind seeing' as our Conversion, 'the lame walking' as Repentance, 'lepers cleansing' as Confession, 'the deaf hearing'. Inspirations that come to us, and 'the dead rising' as Vocations to live by.

'The poor having the gospel preached to them' is a miracle - the whole world covered now by parishes and churches.

Jesus next says that no-one had been greater than John the Baptist.

Then He says that the least in 'the kingdom of God' would be greater than John.

Did He mean - us, in Heaven, happy and glorious, shining like stars?

Or, more likely, us - in the Church, now, 'the kingdom of God'?

Think of the many things you are given.

You are baptised — freed from universal sin. You are confirmed — given God, in the Holy Spirit. You receive Jesus Himself, into your life, at Mass. You have been taught the Creed, God's truth; and the Our Father, God's prayer. You are encouraged by holy Writings, and the Lives of Saints. You have firm teaching about right and wrong.

You are surrounded everywhere by beautiful churches, music, works of art. You have great examples from the Saints and saintly people you might know.

Even the kindly supervision you may feel, and perhaps might resent, from others in the church — does help!

All these are greater than even John the Baptist could have imagined.

'Count your blessings', as they say. Indeed.

PLEASE SUPPORT THE SVP IN THE SUDAN. In 1988 we opened a feeding centre which fed 230 babies every other day; and the programme peaked at 10,000 babies a day for 5 days a week. The centres are near camps for displaced people not far from Khartoum. Vast numbers of the population have been displaced because of unrest in the Sudan and Darfur. The SVP is running this programme and keeping babies alive and giving them hope for the future. It costs £40 a year for each baby to provide nourishing food. Would you like to help? £40 for a year's food, or £20 for six months or £100 for vocational training for 2 adults or £60 for medical treatment for 20 patients.
