# TO LIFE THROUGH DEATH

HERE is a sculpture of the dead Lazarus by Epstein in the chapel of New College Oxford. It is carved out of a pure white stone, and is rather more than life size. Lazarus is represented as dead but standing upright, a hint that though dead he will return to life. He is wrapped closely around by the grave cloths which enclose his entire body, legs held together and arms tight to his sides. The limitation of death is vividly shown. He has clearly been laid flat on his front on the grave slab, but his face is turned to one side. There is a cloth over his head, but his face is uncovered, with the eyes and mouth closed. The emphasis is on the reality of his death. He stands there awaiting the command of Christ: 'Lazarus, come forth'. When he hears that, he will return to life, the life he had lived before in Bethany, with his sisters Martha and Mary; and as John says in his Gospel, a few days later he will be one of those enjoying a meal which his sisters made for Jesus.

So Lazarus' return to life is not like the resurrection of Jesus. Lazarus comes back to his old life and will have to die again. Jesus was raised to a life that was completely new and eternal, because it is God sharing his life with us. Lazarus' rising cannot be like this, because Jesus has not yet died and risen. Nevertheless Lazarus stands as a symbol of Jesus' resurrection, because as Jesus says: 'This illness is not unto death; it is for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified by means of it'. Because of the raising of Lazarus 'many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus', so much so that the Chief Priests planned to put Lazarus to death as well as Jesus (John 12: 10-11). The raising of Lazarus was the challenge which led either to faith or to rejection, just as the resurrection of Jesus was.

The way of faith leads to freedom and life. In the life of the resurrection, the limitations of our humanity — the grave cloths — are set aside for ever. We become free to share in the glory of God. But it is only by undergoing death as Jesus did that we can share in that life; only by following him that we can (as we say at the Offertory at every Mass) 'share the divinity of Him who shares our humanity'.
