There is more to being good than just behaving correctly

ODAY'S Gospel is part of the Sermon on the Mount. There Jesus told us he had come to fulfil the Law. By this he meant two things. First, he shows that God's will for us extends beyond the way we behave to our inner-most thoughts and longings. These inspire how we behave. Next, Jesus fulfils the Law by himself revealing God's will for us. He can speak with divine authority. These two ways in which Christ fulfils the Law are reflected in today's Gospel.

In the past the prophets had said, 'Thus said the Lord....' They were God's spokesmen, who expressed God's will for His people, not their own. In fact prophets who spoke in their own name were strongly condemned as being false. But Jesus introduced His teaching in a very different and scandalous way. Instead of saying, 'Thus says the Lord,' he would say, 'It was said to you of old, but I say to you....' As He spoke in His own name He claimed divine authority in interpreting God's will for us.

In general Jesus taught that there's more to being good than behaving correctly, though we must certainly do that. But there's always the danger of our giving a false impression of being outwardly respectable, when we're rotten inside. Being a good person must reach down to the way we think and desire. After all, our actions arise from our thoughts and longings.

For example, while the Law forbids murder Jesus condemns the kind of anger that leads to our lashing out and taking revenge. The innocent victim reduces himself to the violent level of the aggressive assailant. We must extinguish the flames of such anger before it leads to violent actions.

After forbidding anger Jesus condemns contemptuous speech. This arises from pride. We consider we are superior to others, racially, academically or in some other way. We destroy their good name, as well as their self-respect and confidence. Character assassination is a kind of murder. Never should we underestimate the power of speech, either to build someone up or destroy him. A contemptuous word can spark off a pub fight or a race riot.

What Jesus has to say about erotic thoughts and longings requires a balanced approach. Such desires are part of being human — the way God has made us, and therefore good. But powerful emotions are involved, which can easily get out of control, leading to wrongful desires and actions. We need to keep these emotions on a tight rein and not look for troublesome erotic stimulants. It's important to remember that being tempted is not a sin; giving in is.
