F you look in the crib you will see some new exotic-looking characters. Already shepherds are there, worshipping the baby Jesus. Now people known as 'Magi' join them. They were pagan astrologers — wise men who had come from the East — probably from Babylon. We're not told how many came, but traditionally there were three of them, on account of the number of their gifts.

What a contrast they made with the shepherds! The shepherds would have been poor and unlettered Jews who had been grazing their sheep on the nearby hills. Angels had led them to the manger.

In contrast, we have the pagan magi who had come from afar. They were scholars, whose natural curiosity and wisdom had set them out on a journey, which led them to Christ. But to find Him they needed more than natural wisdom. God had inspired them to follow the star, and they needed the revelation of Scripture, explained by the Jewish authorities, to enable them to complete their journey.

At the manger we see both Jews and pagans, rich and poor. They represent all of us, regardless of our colour, race, class or religion. The Son of God shared our human life, lived among us and died for everyone. Though each of us has a different starting point Jesus reaches out to all of us. As He draws us to Himself He builds on what we already have; He comes to us where we are and leads us to where we should be.

To find Christ and to follow Him we need the courage and integrity of the Magi, who set out on a journey into the unknown.

We're told that the Magi came with gifts. The gold is seen as representing Christ's kingship, the frankincense His priesthood and the myrrh His burial. These would come together and find their fulfilment in Christ's Passion. Then He would fulfil the hope of salvation of both the Jews and pagans, represented at the manger.

Today's feast celebrates the infant Jesus being shown to the pagan world as king and saviour of all peoples.

The feast of the Epiphany gives hope to all of us, no matter who we are.

Jesus comes to us as we are, where we are, and calls us to follow him to his heavenly kingdom. The Magi heard and said 'Yes' to that call. And when they found Jesus they silently adored him.

Since this is a season for giving presents, let us, with the shepherds and magi, welcome Christ's gift of Himself to each one of us. And let us give ourselves to Him in silent adoration and loving service.
