

CHRISTMAS 2011

EARLY this week I went to a funeral. Perhaps that sounds a bit out of keeping with the Christmas story! And in one way I suppose it is; but it made me think. The person who had died was an old friend, who was 97; so she had had a good innings, a full life, and there were plenty of friends and relations there to pray for her. And I expect many of us were thinking: 'What a shame that she died just before Christmas'. We rightly think of Christmas as being about new life, which of course it is: the baby in the manger, and all sorts of different people coming to welcome the new born Child, the Son of God and son of Mary.

But in all human experience, life and death are interwoven, in many different ways. Just think of the Christmas story. There is death there as well as life and the two are directly linked. The infants were slaughtered by Herod because Jesus was born; and the Holy Family was immediately forced to undergo a kind of death by being driven into exile in Egypt. Then of Mary it was prophesied: 'a sword will pierce your own heart'; and doubtless it was not only at Jesus' death that this was fulfilled. Every parent, but especially every mother, suffers agonies because of their children. There is in parenthood a call to constant self-sacrifice and self-giving which is itself a kind of death.

So it is not only during Holy Week and Easter that we realise the close link between life and death, between crucifixion and resurrection. It is fascinating to see how many paintings of the Nativity and the childhood of Jesus, by old masters, give hints of his coming death. The shadow of the Cross falls over the stable at Bethlehem and the home at Nazareth.

So perhaps it was not so inappropriate after all that my old friend should die just before Christmas. Moreover, the new life that Jesus brings us at Christmas is not like the life which we all inherit from our parents. That is a life which may be filled with disappointments, suffering, sickness and finally death. But what Jesus was born to bring to us is a life without end, a life which fulfils all that we can ever need or desire, because it is a share in the very life of God himself. That is what we think of as we worship the Child in the Manger.

The Dominican brethren of Holy Cross community wish you every blessing for Christmas and 2012, and offer grateful thanks for your continuing support.

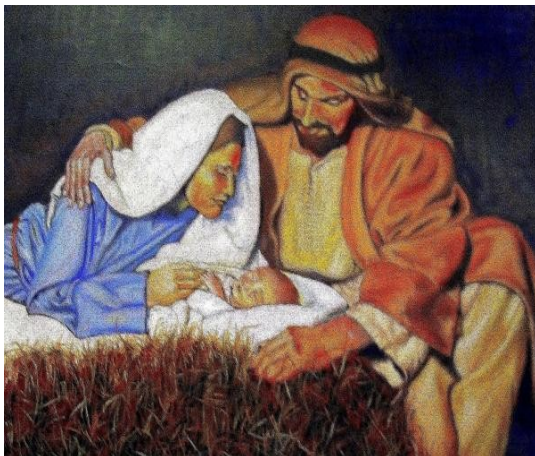
