N today's gospel passage Jesus seems to be contradicting Himself. He is saying, here, that everyone should see how good we are. However, at the end of this same, rather long, sermon, He will say that we should do any good, very secretly. He makes a joke, about it, that our left hand shouldn't know what our right hand is doing there.

He even says that we should pray in secret. We might wonder what He would think of our Church Services and Public Devotions. We shouldn't simply be - idly - puzzled. We should make efforts to understand.

This whole sermon begins with what we call, solemnly, the Beatitudes. So solemnly that we may miss their whole 'punch'. Jesus says that those who seem unhappy and cursed are very blessed. They are all involved in what God is up to. This may be the key to the whole message. At the end of the sermon we are told that Jesus made a deep impression on the people, because 'He taught them with authority', and not like their own 'scribes'.

It wasn't all common sense. They knew that common sense doesn't work, won't do. It was all in the world of God. This isn't our world at all. It's the very opposite. Jesus will tell story after story. He will help and heal. He will even die, forgivingly. He will return to life miraculously. He will leave us ceremonies, to recall all this. He will do it all, to show God's world.

So He warns, how showing off, in good works, and even in praying, is so wrong.

People have seen this, detested it, and been led away from God by it. We are to do good, and pray, so differently. Not by ourselves, but among ourselves. With God. We know how. Don't we?

Leicester City of Sanctuary Drop-in Centre for Asylum Seekers and Refugees. A new Drop-In Centre, in the old Barclay's Bank Building on the corner of Town Hall Square and Horsefair Street, is now open every Wednesday between 12 noon and 4.00 p.m. The centre contains a computer room, and a room with large tables where they plan to hold craft groups of various kinds, and they are hoping to have sewing machines available. There is a therapy room where two volunteers can carry out therapeutic massage sessions.

There is a large sitting area with comfortable furniture where people can read, play board games, work on jigsaws or just sit and chat, and there is a children's playroom with toys, and there are rooms to play table tennis and darts. If you are an asylum seeker, have recently had leave to remain, or have come to the end of the asylum process, you will be made very welcome at the centre.
