The Legion of Mary

AY is Mary's month", as the poet reminds us, and so it's also a good occasion to speak of the Legion of Mary, which has recently started in this parish. The Legion is one of those ideas that is so simple that it's surprising that they weren't thought of before. It's an association of lay people within the parish, meeting once a week, whose members perform some 'apostolic' work in pairs each week. The work is often visiting homes within the parish, or (with the necessary permissions) it could be visiting a prison or hospital. Other examples of recommended works are: setting out a stall with books or leaflets on offer for the general public; reaching out to immigrants from Catholic countries, who are sometimes in danger of giving up the practice of the faith when they come to a strange environment; helping the homeless or destitute; helping with catechesis; coming to pray when the body of a dead person is received into church the evening before a funeral. In our day, 'pro-life' work is certainly essential too. Naturally, everything is done in union with the parish priest and his assistants.

Of course there are already excellent groups that do at least some of these works, and also individual faithful who do them without belonging to any special group. One might therefore ask whether there is a place for the Legion of Mary. But two things at least are distinctive about the Legion. The first is that it explicitly takes as its goal 'the glory of God through the salvation of souls'. Whatever work is done, even if it is something very practical like helping in a soup-kitchen, the 'legionary' is encouraged to keep before his eyes the spiritual needs, often very pressing needs, of the people to whom he is sent. This doesn't mean that he should 'preach' at them, in an aggressive or inept way. But it does mean that he shouldn't be afraid to speak of the things of God, and the Catholic faith.

The other striking thing about the Legion is the discipline that it encourages among its members. Each unit (the 'praesidium') is united to the world-wide organisation in a precisely defined way, and the meetings follow the same pattern wherever in the world they occur: reports on works, prayers, planning of future works. The point of this discipline is to keep alive in the legionaries the sense of being soldiers in a spiritual battle. We're all engaged in this battle, in fact, in virtue of our confirmation: but the legionaries choose to commit themselves to it in this further way, under the special patronage of our Lady.

So if you think this might be for you, come and try. The Holy Cross praesidium meets every Tuesday in the priory, normally at 7:30pm. Membership is open to any Catholic of 18 or over who is willing to fulfil the duties set out in the Legion *Handbook*.


