## THE BAPTISM OF JESUS

E have probably all grown up to think of Christmas and the Epiphany as two separate festivals, commemorating two separate events, Jesus' birth and the coming of the Magi. If so, then it might be quite a surprise to learn that it was not till the 4<sup>th</sup> century that it became common to celebrate the birth of Jesus on 25<sup>th</sup> December. Before that the Church celebrated around this time a whole cluster of events which manifested the presence, the person and the power of Jesus. There was first his birth in Bethlehem and his manifestation to the Jews and to the poor as represented by the shepherds; then there was the coming of the Magi who, with their gifts, represent the pagan world responding in faith to the showing forth of God-made-man; then the Baptism of Jesus, at which he is declared to be the Beloved Son of the Father, endowed with the Holy Spirit; and lastly the turning of water into wine at the marriage at Cana in Galilee, which (as St John's gospel says) was the first of Jesus' signs and 'revealed his glory, and his disciples believed in him'.


So we can think of today's celebration of the Baptism of Jesus as a continuation of Christmas, as our continuing worship of the One who was manifested to us in so many different ways for our salvation. For us, baptism into Christ is a cleansing from all sin because we are being born again into his Body. The baptism that Jesus received was the baptism of John, which was a sign that a person was repentant and had joined himself to those who were looking forward to the coming of the Messiah. Jesus had no sins of his own to repent of. But by accepting John's baptism he associated himself with us in our need. So the point about the baptism of Jesus is not the effect that it had on him, but what it tells us about him.

The words spoken at Jesus' baptism, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you', echo the prophecy of Isaiah in the first reading of today's Mass. Pondering on that reading will show us not only what Jesus is like, but also how we as his disciples should try to live. The son or servant (the same word in the original) of God is the one who is endowed with the Spirit to 'bring true justice to the nations'. He will achieve his aim not by force and violence but by unwavering faithfulness. He is to serve the cause of right, to open the eyes of the blind and give liberty to those who are enslaved. All this is what Jesus does for you and for me. And he asks us in turn to do the same for one another.

Blessed chalk for Epiphany will be distributed after each Mass today. There is a custom, in Epiphany-tide, of writing the initials of the three magi above the front door of one's house or room, along with the year. So this year we write: 20 + C + M + B + 11. As well as standing for Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, these initials are short for *Christus mansionem benedicat*, 'May Christ bless [this] dwelling'. So we're asking for the protection of Christ and his saints over our house, and at the same time make a small public profession of faith. If you've not had your house or flat blessed by a priest, now is a good time of year to do so. Any of the community at Holy Cross will be happy to oblige! (or ask your Parish Priest, if you live outside the parish).
