# XVI SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

# 1<sup>ST</sup> READING: WISDOM 12. 13, 16-19

One of the purposes of the Book of Wisdom was to commend the Jewish religion to those in Alexandria who had influenced by Greek philosophers. So he stressed attributes of the God of Israel and His followers which appeal to the pagans: such as justice, mildness, forbearance and hope of forgiveness.

# RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 86 "LORD, YOU ARE GOOD AND FORGIVING"

The psalmist, speaking on his own behalf or that of the nation confidently appeals to God's mercy, in which he shows His true greatness, and for which the nations will praise Him.

# 2<sup>ND</sup> READING : ROMANS 8. 26-27

This short reading is aa great help when we have difficulty in praying. Don't worry because the Spirit inspires even the most inarticulate groan, and knows what it means.

# GOSPEL: MATTHEW 13. 24-43

In today's Gospel Jesus uses three growth parables to tell us about the Kingdom of Heaven. In the first He uses the problem facing every farmer and gardener. What do you do about the weeds, especially when at the early stages they are almost indistinguishable from the good plants. Jesus urges patience and caution lest the good may be rooted out with the bad. The same must be true in not ruthlessly striving for a perfect Church and excluding any who fall short. Instead, we must leave the sorting out to God.

The next two parables are about growth from small beginnings, and are meant to give us encouragement. The first appeals to gardeners and shows that a large bush grows from a small mustard seed. The second appeals to woman who knows that in backing bread a small piece of yeast can produce a large loaf.

# THE PROBLEM OF WEEDS

# Fr Isidore reflects on our Sunday Gospels for this time of year ...

During the World War II my brothers and I used to grow our own vegetables. 'Digging for Victory' was our small contribution to the war effort. As the tiny shoots lettuces and cabbages, broke the surface, weeds would sprout up among them. At first there appeared to be no difference. What should we do about the weeds? That's a question every farmer or gardener asks himself.

That's the theme of today's Gospel, which develops last Sunday's parable of the sower. That told us that the seed was the Word of God, who guaranteed a bumper harvest. The parable of the sower introduced us to some of the threats, which hinder the Word of God from taking root and bearing fruit.

Today's Gospel focuses on one of those threats: weeds. The seed itself is certainly good –it's the Word of God But the weeds are harmful; they choke the growth of the good seed. Darnel was a special problem. Since it tangled its roots around the wheat, it could not be pulled out without removing the good seed. Worse still, its grain was poisonous and looked very much like the good seed. It had to be separated from the good seed, but that could only be done after the harvest.

What are these weeds, almost indistinguishable from the good grain? They are people who threaten the life and growth of the Good News in Christ's followers. They are not only outside the Church, but also within it. Let's face, each one of us is a mixture of good and evil. At times, we all set a bad example and lead people astray. Zealots who would welcome only the perfect would exclude everybody. If they were honest, that would include themselves! The Church would be empty.

Jesus recognises that even His Church would contain sinners. Instead of instantly destroying them, He is patient; He does all that He can to seek the lost sheep, to bring the sinner to repentance. Only at the last judgment will the Lord of the Harvest sort out and punish those who refuse His mercy.

But what should be done with the enemies, the people who sow the poisonous seed, the darnel of secular, materialistic values of modern society. They attack the growth of the Word of God.

Today we rightly place great store on freedom of speech. That's a matter of justice. Silencing those with whom we disagree can lead to totalitarian dictatorships, which don't allow open criticism and correction. That could be a greater evil than allowing people the freedom to spread false ideas.

But freedom of speech carries serious responsibilities -to seek the truth and share it with others. We do live amidst a mixture of truth and error, and need great discernment to distinguish the one from the other. Those who are very vulnerable need to be protected from harmful ideas and images. In extreme cases, certain material may be so offensive that for the good of the community it should be suppressed and its disseminators punished. But following the argument of the parable, drastically weeding out error is not always the best approach.

Meanwhile God is patient with those who spread false ideas, which undermine the Good News and can cause so much harm. Eventually he will sort out and punish such people; the Good News of the Kingdom will be triumphant.

Above all, God recognises that nobody is completely evil. There's some good in all of us. God's grace and mercy can encourage us and lead even the worst sinner to conversion. The weeds can become desirable fruitful plants! But that's not part of this parable.
