THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

34TH SUNDAY, ORDINARY TIME- CHRIST THE KING

Throughout His ministry Jesus preached about the kingdom of God. He used parables to tell us what it was like and what we must do to enter it. But not once, during His ministry, did He claim to be king. Still less, would He accept that title and role when, at the height of His popularity, the crowds tried to make Him their leader. But Jesus was not prepared to give them the type of leadership they wanted from Him. His mission was not to head a popular uprising against the Romans, occupying the land of Israel.

Only when the crowds had turned against Him for not fulfilling their hopes did Jesus finally claim to be king. Only when Jesus had no support and was incapable of leading a rebellion against the Romans did He accept the title of 'King.' What is more, He added that being king was the whole purpose of His life. It's ironic that Jesus only claimed sovereignty when that appeared to be humanly impossible –when He was powerless and was about to be executed as a criminal. His claim to kingship would seem to be a defiant, but futile gesture.

But at His trial Jesus explained, 'My kingdom is not of this world.' His kingdom is like no secular state. Nor is He in competition with any of them. His kingdom is like nothing on earth! He posed no threat to their sovereignty or authority. The Romans needn't have feared that He would lead an uprising to remove them.

And yet, in the face of defeat, Jesus claims a very special sovereignty. He would be enthroned on the cross, not in a palace. Instead of people honouring Him, they would despise and reject this ridiculous claimant to kingship. Nevertheless, He would be triumphant and victorious at the moment of His apparent defeat. Not conquering lands by force of arms, but defeating evil through the power of His love. His was the victory of goodness over evil, life over death. As today's Preface tells us His is a kingdom of peace, justice, love and truth. Now Christ, the King, is sovereign Lord of heaven and earth.

With great irony Mark tells us that at Christ's trial and crucifixion He was mocked and sentenced to the death of a criminal for claiming to be king. And so, He was. Both the pagan Romans and the Jewish religious leaders, followed by the people, gave Jesus the correct title, without understanding or believing what His sovereignty meant.

Today's Gospel tells us that only one person understood and welcomed Christ's Kingship. Surprisingly, that was the pagan centurion who supervised Jesus' execution. He exclaimed, "*Truly this man was the Son of God!*" (Mk. 15.59), as Jesus died. At last, after nearly everyone else had failed to understand the title of Mark's Gospel, this centurion received a glimpse of its true meaning. The '*Gospel of Jesus Christ, Son God'* was all about the crucified Christ. For the Son of God to become the promised Messiah/Christ, who would save us from the power of evil, He must be crucified! It was through the cross that Jesus became the Saviour-King. That was the answer to the so-called 'Messianic Secret.'

Today we honour Christ, our King. As we praise Him for the victory, He has won for us we renew our allegiance to Him -not only in word, but indeed. Jesus Himself tells us He won't recognise us as loyal members of His Kingdom if we simply call Him 'Lord' and then flout His will. That would be to mock Him.

Especial today we pray that Christ the King may rule our minds and hearts and welcome us into his heavenly kingdom. May He establish His reign of 'peace, love, justice and truth' throughout the world!
