## VANDALISM IN THE CHURCH AND PRIORY

Recently there has been much controversy in the press regarding our erection of security grilles on the lower level windows of the church and priory. We had no choice but to take these measures, as expenditure on window replacement as a result of repeated and consistent vandalism runs over £10k at present. Following meetings with Leicester City Council, we have agreed a suitable way forward, which means that the security provided by the grilles remains in place until alternative arrangements can be made. While we are disappointed that some of our neighbours on New Walk, and some of the businesses that operate in the vicinity, have been hostile and confrontational, we hope that our openness to addressing the issues will be fruitful in the longer term.

# THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

## HOPE THROUGHOUT THE GENERATIONS

### A THOUGHT FOR THIS SUNDAY

In today's liturgy, the Gospel according to Luke presents the story of the call of the first disciples, with an original version that differs from that of the other two Synoptic Gospels, Matthew and Mark (cf. Mt 4: 18-22; Mk 1:16-20). The call, in fact, was preceded by the teaching of Jesus to the crowd and a miraculous catch of fish, carried out by the will of the Lord (Lk 5:1-6). In fact, while the crowd rushes to the shore of Lake Gennesaret to hear Jesus, he sees Simon discouraged because he has caught nothing all night. First Jesus asks to get into Simon's boat in order to preach to the people standing a short distance from the shore; then, having finished preaching, he commands Simon to go out into the deep with his friends and cast their nets (cf. v. 5). Simon obeys, and they catch an incredible amount of fish. In this way, the evangelist shows how the first disciples followed Jesus, trusting him, relying on his Word, all the while accompanied by miraculous signs. We note that, before this sign, Simon addresses Jesus, calling him "Master" (v. 5), while afterwards he addresses him as "Lord" (v. 7). This is the pedagogy of God's call, which does not consider the quality of those who are chosen so much as their faith, like that of Simon that says: "At your word, I will let down the nets" (v. 5)

### THE WISDOM OF THE SAINTS OF THE CHURCH

The substance and fruit of holy Scripture is very specific: the fullness of eternal happiness. For this is what Scripture is – its words are words of eternal life, and it is written not just so that we should believe, but specially so that we should possess eternal life in which we may see, and love, and have all our desires fulfilled. When they are fulfilled, then we shall know the superabundant love that comes from knowledge, and so we shall be filled with all the fullness of God. God's Scripture tries to lead us to this fullness, and to the truth of the preaching of the apostles. It is to this end, with this intention, that we should study holy Scripture, and teach it, and hear it.

If we are to follow the direct path of Scripture and come straight to the final destination, then right from the beginning – when simple faith starts to draw us towards the light of the Father – our hearts should kneel down and ask the Father to give us, through his Son and the Holy Spirit, true knowledge of Jesus and of his love.

### CONTEMPORARY WITNESS

They're not just any old writings, but neither are they meant to fossilise the message.

They are meant to inspire and continue to inspire the life of the Church, now and through the ages.

# ALL THAT I AM, ALL THAT I DO

DISCIPLESHIP, SHARING, AND SERVICE

## *Fr David reflects on pilgrimage to Lourdes, as we encounter the Lord who calls us to be his disciples*

“All that I am, all that I do, all that I’ll ever have, I offer now to you”. – so go the words of a popular offertory hymn. I know them so very well. For hours, I was stranded with a group of pilgrims in the airport at Lourdes as we waited for a set of storms to pass by. There was no doubt that we’d all had a good week – new friendships made and older ones rekindled; the memories of previous pilgrimages; the sharing of healing experiences and encounters with the Living God, reflecting on the redeemed humanity that is shown to us in the Lady who introduces herself – “I am the Immaculate Conception.”

Yes, the pilgrimage was well and truly over – just the long journey home ahead. The “out-of-office” on the email expired and a pile of the mundane lurked ahead when the return to Leicester would finally happen. It was good for us to be here, but back to reality. The last thing we wanted was a delay – what a bore.

I sat beside my friend Ryan. I’d been to Lourdes with Ryan a few times, but I wasn’t to know that this would be the last time we’d share the pilgrimage together. He’d just turned twenty that year, and was already making great advances in his political career – running for local council and with his eyes set on Westminster. Ryan was going places, he had plenty to offer and he just knew it. From his specially modified chair, to which he was confined, the world was a very beautiful land of opportunity.

When he beckoned to me, I took the seat beside him. “You’d better get praying, Ryan”, I said, “I need to get back to my priory”. “Pray with me, Father” he said, “Will you join me in singing? Do you know ‘All that I am?’”. So there we were, in the departures lounge – with fellow pilgrims doing the actions to “Rise and Shine”, while others learned the Cha Cha Slide, Ryan and myself sang “all that I am”. And we sang it again, and again, and again.

The journey home for me was long and tedious, but so much more so for Ryan. His physical pain and discomfort was beyond anything I can imagine. But he wasn’t trapped by it – Ryan was free! There was a great deal at home which he was waiting to achieve, building on what he had already done, but that didn’t matter so much. Now, he was here. And with a full heart he answered the call of the Lord with the loudest, sweetest voice as he led the singing: “All that I am, all that I do, all that I’ll ever have, I offer now to you”.

Ryan meant those words, and he preached those words. I don’t know if he knew that he was teaching me a valuable lesson that I would return to again and again, or if he was just being Ryan. I expect the latter. Discipleship is not about achievement – although it allows us something of the glory of that. Discipleship is about abandonment to the Lord who comes to meet us. He calls us to be who we are, all that we are, and to offer ourselves to him. See what wonderful things he can do in us!

So many of us have vivid and rich memories of pilgrimage to Lourdes, and the many intentions we have carried there over the years. If you’ve never been, do go. Make a trip with the many groups who accompany the sick and infirm. And say a prayer that you might be called there some day, when you need some healing and peace.

When I lift my candle for the Ave Maria during the Lourdes procession today, I’ll remember Ryan, and all those who I’ve shared this special experience with. And I will give thanks that I have received much more than I ever expected to, when I had the opportunity to give my time in service of others.

Just over a year ago, Ryan’s journey on earth came to an end. Sometimes, when I get weary of life, I like to remember Ryan’s loud and beautiful rendition of those words, All that I am, all that I do, all that I’ll ever have, I offer now to you. And I’ll try to live by it.
