LAUNCH OF THE FRASSATI CENTRE

MERCIFUL LIKE THE FATHER

A THOUGHT FOR THIS SUNDAY

Today's In this Sunday Gospel, Jesus exhorts us to do justice and show mercy to our neighbours. What we wish our neighbours to do to us, we must do that to them for this is the meaning of loving our enemies as ourselves. The commandments of Jesus, especially the commandment to love our enemies, are opposed to the corrupt and fallen human nature. Jesus came to renew and regenerate the corrupt and fallen human nature.

As disciples of Jesus, we have to show mercy and compassion to our enemies. We, who are born anew in Christ Jesus, should reflect His nature of mercy and compassion in our lives. God is merciful, and so we who are His children, should show mercy to others. We are to do good to them who hate us. This kind of a behavior is possible only if we are Christlike which happens by dwelling much with Him. The world's hatred, curses and mischief must be met with Christian benevolence, blessings and prayers.

As followers of Christ we must be moderate and merciful in judging others. We ourselves are bad coins when we stand before Christ. Only a merciful God can forgive and accept us. If we judge harshly those minute faults of others, then the Lord will judge severely our manifold faults. We are to exercise that kind of love which will be merciful in judging and condemning others, and which will be generous in giving others. These earthly mercies will be repaid with heavenly reward. God recompenses are always abundant recompenses.

THE WISDOM OF THE SAINTS OF THE CHURCH

A charitable mind is not displayed simply in giving money; it is manifested still more by personal service as well as by the communication of God's word to others: In fact, if a man's service towards his brothers is genuine and if he really renounces worldly concerns, he is freed from selfish desires. For he now shares in God's own knowledge and love. Since he does possess God's love, he does not experience weariness as he follows the Lord his God. Rather, following the prophet Jeremiah, he withstands every type of reproach and hardship without even harbouring an evil thought towards any man. For Jeremiah warns us: *Do not say: "We are the Lord's temple."* Neither should you say: "Faith alone in our Lord Jesus Christ can save me." By itself faith accomplishes nothing. *For even the devils believe and shudder.*

CONTEMPORARY WITNESS

Following St Augustine's example, we too need to believe that God can and will convert hearts. Has he not converted ours? So, God mercifully now invites us to participate in this conversion; to become 'co-redeemers' with Christ by praying for the salvation of our enemies. May our enemies stir up in us the desire to become like God. Hence, when we are hurt and maltreated by other human beings, let our response be divine. For does not the Blessed Trinity dwell within us? Does the blood of Jesus not flow in our veins? And doesn't the fire of God's Spirit burns in our hearts? Yes, for we belong to the Lord, and the world has a desperate need to see the difference his grace makes. So, let our response to all, friend and foe alike, be like Christ's: love, do good, bless, and pray. (cf Lk 6:27-28) It may be that, seeing our good works, others will look upon us Christians and desire also to become like God, the only true and living God of Love.

UPON THIS ROCK

BUILDING A CHURCH WHERE EVERYONE IS SAFE FROM ABUSE

Fr David reflects on the international conference of bishops from across the world, meeting with Pope Francis this weekend, to reflect on the failures of the Church to respond to abuse in all its forms.

You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the underworld will never hold out against it.

For years and years, we have been abhorred and appalled by revelation upon revelation of abuses in the church throughout the world. While the sexual and physical abuse of children is the most horrendous sin that has been repeatedly committed by flawed and wayward shepherds of God's people, we cannot fail to recognise also the physical abuse of children, and the sexual abuse of seminarians, young women and men, vulnerable people, religious sisters. The categories are countless. The whole debacle is compounded by the systematic cover-up of these crimes that seems to have been endemic in the attitude of senior pastors in the Church. There is no longer any place to hide from this reality. It has been proven time and again. It is painful to face, but it must be faced. The culture has to change. The abuse must not be tolerated. The covering up must stop.

This weekend, our bishops ask for our prayers, as an important conference takes place in Rome. Called by Pope Francis, senior bishops from across the globe are gathered to reflect on how the Church can be comprehensively reformed in the approach to these matters. This needs to happen, without a doubt, but can these bishops be trusted? Will things change? We need to ask the question.

During the past week, we celebrated the Feast of the Chair of St Peter. This feast recognises the primacy of St Peter amongst the apostles, and the steadfast office entrusted to Peter for the whole Church of God. Peter was a weak and vulnerable man, but he was not lacking in courage. He was able to endure many trials, encountering his own significant failings, as he gave everything to follow his Lord and Master.

Jesus referred to Peter as the Rock on which he would build the Church. This was because Peter caught a fleeting glimpse of the Resurrection, in the Lord who he recognised as 'the Son of the Living God'. Peter would fail abysmally to understand the Lord's explanation of the Cross and Passion, but the glimpse he had was enough for him to be encouraged to embrace his own failings and short-sightedness and follow the Lord where he led.

Can we trust Pope Francis and the bishops to give us leadership? This needs to be proven to us, as we have all been let down so many times, and our pain is great. We need to pray for them, as their weaknesses are all too apparent. Indeed, this is not limited to them. Each of us who assume the role of the shepherd need to focus on our weakness for the sake of those in our care. Every single one of us has a responsibility to give leadership and be vigilant for the wellbeing and safety of each member of the flock.

There is so much more that could be said. Indeed, there will be necessity to reflect upon it as a community again and again. But for now we must be ready to take action, to change our culture. Survivors and victims of the different kinds of abuse are not strangers. They are in our midst, they are with us every day. They are real, and their suffering is real. It is the duty of each one of us to ensure that their voices are heard, that action is taken, that justice is done.

Let's pray for the whole Church as we address this issue. May our approach be dynamic and radical, putting together new strategies to ensure that past abuses are acknowledged and action taken, that present abuse is eradicated, that future abuse is prevented. Let's ensure that cover-up is exposed and expunged from every aspect of our church. Let's make sure that we start again. And let's make sure that we don't let it drop, ever, until the church is a safe and stable environment in which every person is equally cherished and valued.
