THE DAY OF RESURRECTION!

A THOUGHT FOR THIS SUNDAY

Jesus reaches down to that basic yearning of every human being. And that yearning can only be satisfied by the love of God coming into his heart, no conditions, no extra reasons why you should or should not have this gift. He reaches down — as he does to every single human being, into the deepest part of our hearts, where the yearning for completion is born with us and stays with us no matter how many sins, no matter how many betrayals, no matter what we do, there is that hunger of the heart — and Jesus, in his great generosity, forgets everything else and reaches down and says to Peter: "Feed my sheep. I love you, I trust you and now I ask you to take care of them for me." And when Peter hears that, three times, he knows that there is something here more than forgiveness. It is that Jesus loves him and forgets everything except his love for Peter and he wants him to continue to be the one who would lead his church. This is the kind of forgiveness that is here. It's as if Jesus was saying, "It doesn't matter. It doesn't matter. You don't have to do penance, you don't have to be on your knees, you don't have to cry for my forgiveness, for I have loved you from the beginning, and I will be faithful and true to that love for as long as we are together." The church is founded not on forgiveness, not on tolerance, not on finally coming to terms that we have to forgive each other. The church is founded on the love of God which doesn't ask that we ask for forgiveness. For God forgives even before we think of committing the sins, so great is His love. And that's the lovely thing about today's gospel. We're not to go out into the world and say, "Now if you forgive and fall on your knees and say three Hail Marys and three Our Fathers then we will forgive you." This is not from God. When we say those words what we mean is this: you are already forgiven by a lovely God who forgives and forgets even before you ask Him.

THE WISDOM OF THE SAINTS OF THE CHURCH

The apostles, in their recollections, which are called gospels, handed down to us what Jesus commanded them to do. They tell us that he took bread, gave thanks and said: *Do this in memory of me. This is my body*. In the same way he took the cup, he gave thanks and said: *This is my blood*. The Lord gave this command to them alone. Ever since then we have constantly reminded one another of these things. The rich among us help the poor and we are always united. For all that we receive we praise the Creator of the universe through his Son Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit. On Sunday we have a common assembly of all our members, whether they live in the city or the outlying districts. The recollections of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as there is time. When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings. Then we all stand up together and pray.

CONTEMPORARY WITNESS

St Peter has a past, we all know about this past, his betrayal, his failure at the moment of the Cross, and the moment that showed that he really did not know who he was. That failure echoes throughout the whole of the history of the Church. We will remember the words of St Peter until the end of time. 'I do not know him'. Yet we also know that St Peter is to be redeemed and is with Christ forever, not in spite of those words but through them. The grace of God is great enough. While we live, we are always in a single moment, always at an exact point in time and space, but what we have been is part of that moment, and what we can be, long to be, and by God's grace will be, is also part of that moment. Do you love me, is always a question for now, but it is never just about that 'now'. Only Christ can truly know that St Peter loves him, because he sees the whole of his life, he alone knows all things.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

DO YOU LOVE ME?

Fr Thomas Skeats OP reflects on the missionary discipleship of St Peter

At the beginning of his public ministry, Jesus goes to his hometown of Nazareth and entering the synagogue reads a passage from the book of Isaiah: 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor and to proclaim liberty to captives and sight to the blind' (Luke 4:14-21). Jesus applies these words to himself and to his mission. He is anointed by the Spirit to bring Good News to the world. He is anointed as prophet, priest and king. Every Christian disciple, anointed by the Holy Spirit at Baptism, is called to follow Jesus in this three-fold mission of prophet, priest and king.

When Jesus appears to Peter after his Resurrection, he asks Peter three times 'Do you love me?' After each declaration of his love, the Lord entrusts Peter with a task: 'Feed my lambs', 'Tend my sheep', 'Feed my sheep'. In each of the three invitations to declare his love for the Lord, Peter is being called to share intimately in the threefold ministry of the Lord. He is called to bear witness to the love of God as priest, prophet, and king. This is the mark of discipleship after the Resurrection - that the love of God is expressed in the world through our baptismal calling to serve one another in imitation of Christ as priest, prophet, and king.

'Simon, do you love me? Feed my lambs.' Christ as priest offers prayers and sacrifices for those entrusted to his care, for his lambs, his little ones. Peter assumes the care of the fledgling flock whose task it will be to pray for the well-being of the Church and the world. Each faithful disciple, having been anointed with the Holy Spirit, in obedience to the promptings of the Spirit is moved to offer prayer and sacrifice to enliven and build up the community of faith.

'Simon, do you love me? Tend my sheep.' The prophet bears witness to the truth of God's love for the world and to his victory over evil, revealed in the mystery of the Resurrection. Christ was put to death for preaching God to the world. Witnessing to God involves taking up the Cross and being led to places we may not wish to go. Peter had struggled with the mystery of the Lord's death. In the events leading up to the crucifixion he had denied the Lord three times. He was fearful and apprehensive. After the Resurrection, however, the Lord reveals to Peter that he too must embrace the Cross, if he is to obey the command to "Follow me." Those in authority will always try to find ways - however subtle - to frustrate the preaching of the Gospel. Preaching the truth of the Gospel is very seldom easy. We see this in our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles. But the message of that reading is that we must be obedient to our vocation to witness, knowing that we do so under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

'Simon, do you love me? Feed my sheep.' The continuing presence of sinfulness and evil in the world makes hope difficult, but it is our kingly calling to work to overcome the power of evil in our own lives and in the world, thereby sharing in Jesus' mission to have God reign in the hearts of all so that peace and the Lord's justice - the proper order of things intended by God - may hold sway in the world. We know that Christ has triumphed over sin and death and has been raised up, the first-born from the dead, to be king of kings (Revelation 1:5). In Baptism, we have died with Christ and are offered a share in his Resurrection. We are offered a share in his kingly reign.
