The summer months take us to many different places. As we carry the Blessed Sacrament in procession through the streets today, lets encourage one another on the journey we all face. We are nourished by God's grace in so many ways. We're called to feast on that grace at the Mass.

Be intent on prayer, and whatever may happen will turn to our good.

SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER – BE MY DISCIPLES

A THOUGHT FOR THIS SUNDAY

This Sunday's Gospel, taken from Chapter Fourteen of the Gospel according to St John, gives us an implicit spiritual portrait of the Virgin Mary when Jesus says: "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him and we shall come to him and make our home with him". These words are addressed to the disciples but can be applied to a maximum degree precisely to the One who was the first and perfect disciple of Jesus. Mary, in fact, observed first and fully the words of her Son, showing that she loved him not only as a mother, but first of all as a humble and obedient handmaid. For this reason God the Father loved her and the Most Holy Trinity made its dwelling place in her.

Responsorial Psalm: Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

THE WISDOM OF THE SAINTS OF THE CHURCH

Those who have a sure hope, guaranteed by the Spirit, that they will rise again lay hold of what lies in the future as though it were already present. They say: "Outward appearances will no longer be our standard in judging other men. Our lives are all controlled by the Spirit now, and are not confined to this physical world that is subject to corruption. The light of the Only-begotten has shone on us, and we have been transformed into the Word, the source of all life. While sin was still our master, the bonds of death had a firm hold on us, but now that the righteousness of Christ has found a place in our hearts we have freed ourselves from our former condition of corruptibility."

This means that none of us lives in the flesh any more, at least not in so far as living in the flesh means being subject to the weaknesses of the flesh, which include corruptibility. Once we thought of Christ as being in the flesh, but we do not do so any longer, says Saint Paul. By this he meant that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us; he suffered death in the flesh in order to give all men life. It was in this flesh that we knew him before, but we do so no longer. Even though he remains in the flesh, since he came to life again on the third day and is now with his Father in heaven, we know that he has passed beyond the life of the flesh; for having died once, he will never die again, death has no power over him any more. His death was a death to sin, which he died once for all; his life is life with God.

CONTEMPORARY WITNESS

Recognising that Jesus in our passage today is focussing on His humanity, we can start to appreciate not only how Jesus properly speaks in this context of the Father being greater, because an uncreated, omnipresent, purely spiritual being, unconstrained by the limits of time and space is evidently greater than a finite and limited human nature, but also that this passage is revealing to us something really quite magnificent and completely unprecedented: Jesus in His human nature, in a body which shares our finitude, our weakness in all things but sin, is going to be glorified and is going to enter into the life of the Trinity in heaven. Jesus in his full humanity and full divinity will be at the right hand of the Father, and from there He will send the Spirit, opening up the way for us, through the gift of His grace, to follow Him and to come to dwell with the Father also.

GROWING AS DISCIPLES – OUR WAY FORWARD

SEEKING RENEWAL AND DEVELOPMENT OF OUR DOMINICAN LIFE AND MISSION

Fr David shares some thoughts about developing the Dominican life and mission of Holy Cross.

Dear Friends,

When we celebrated Easter Sunday together a few weeks back, I invited you to join me in sharing Eastertide as a time devoted to prayer of thanksgiving in particular. Today, as we celebrate the Sixth Sunday of Easter, we prepare for Eastertide to come to the great climax of the Ascension and Pentecost. In many different ways, the Lord shares His Risen Life with his disciples in the forty days that now draw to a close. They are then privileged to witness the glory of His Ascension, before spending nine days together in prayerful preparation for the great day of Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. What a superabundance of gifts are given to them as they set about fulfilling the commandment to 'make disciples of all the nations'.

I reflected with you that prayer of thanksgiving helps us to recognise the things we have rather than the things we need. That's not to be short-sighted or unambitious about our approach to prayer of intercession. Rather, it gives us the opportunity to realise what needs to be inserted into our prayer of intercession, helping us to know what we really need to ask for. I know that very many of you have responded to my invitation to devote Eastertide to thanksgiving prayer, because I have felt the power of the Holy Spirit as I have thought about the way forward.

May is the month of Our Blessed Lady, and today we celebrate our May Procession. As Pope Benedict points out in the little phrase quoted in the newsletter, the Gospel this Sunday reflects on Her as the first and perfect disciple of Jesus, observing first and fully the words of Her Son. This is surely the bedrock of authentic Marian devotion, and an inspiration to all of us who have been chosen as disciples of the Lord, and invited by Baptism and Confirmation to 'make disciples of all the nations'. We are reminded of this most fundamental calling at the conclusion of every Mass. The life and mission of the Dominican Order is to make this manifest amongst the people to whom we are sent as preachers. It is often said that the aim of the Dominican Life is to contemplate, and to share the fruits of contemplation with others. This particular phrase has resonated with me during Eastertide, and I want to use it now to shape our way forward in this significant year for us.

A number of years ago, the Dominican Community presented to you a programme for pastoral development entitled *On Firm Foundations*. Much of that involved looking at structural and managerial issues (not least financial) that required attention. Looking forward to this year of anniversary, we had many hopes and dreams, summed up in a pastoral assembly. A great deal has been achieved, thanks to our spirit of collaboration, and indeed some of the foundations laid in those days are only starting to bear fruit. We no longer have the significant financial problems of those days, and our buildings are much more adequate. The time has come to build on those firm foundations. Our efforts have resulted in bearing fruit. Now is time to share the fruit.

Over the next few weeks, I want to develop with the Dominican Community and with all of you a new pastoral programme: *Share the fruits*. We will want to root this in our Dominican tradition. This will involve a recommitment to our shared calling to discipleship, and our mission to 'share the fruits' by 'making disciples of all the nations'. As we celebrate Ascension on Thursday, I invite you all to join me in a novena of prayer for this pastoral strategy for our community. Then we will celebrate the launch of it on Pentecost Sunday with our Provincial. You can find the prayer below.

Thank you for taking the time to read this. I look forward to embarking on this exciting journey of renewal with you.
