A time of gifts

olidays allow us a change of gear. Even though our 24/7 society never fully sleeps, most of us will have experienced a few quiet days, catching up with family and friends, with films, or music, or reading or re-reading books. I must admit to being addicted to that last solitary vice, which from the beginning of the week has the additional advantage of helping commuters endure both the travelling conditions and swingeing fare rises in the bleak return to work.

One of the books I return to often is the tale of a disaffected schoolboy, a youth whose parents had divorced; who, though bright, was too noisy and energetic for most of the institutions trying to educate him, which reluctantly washed their hands of him (patience: I am not – yet – inviting you to hug a hoody); who conceived the mad idea, in his eighteenth year, of setting off in a January storm to walk across Europe; who was Patrick Leigh Fermour, who died in June 2011, aged 96. His account of the first half of his journey from London to Constantinople, from the Hook of Holland to the Middle Danube, published as 'A Time of Gifts', though written more than forty years after the event is one of the best pieces of travel writing in English. He set out in January, 1933 – fifteen years after the 'war to end wars' had ended, six years before that European spasm of self-destruction was to resume; about two-thirds of the book recounts his travels through Germany, where the Weimar republic had collapsed and the National Socialists had just taken power.

Imagine the scenario. A young man, from a recently hostile nation, with poor command of the language, and in the depths of an economic recession, fetches up on the doorstep, often in bad weather, often at night, and is welcomed, sheltered, fed, has his scanty clothing laundered, and is sent on his way with fresh provisions. He fetches up, on Sylversterabend or Hogmanay, in an inn in Heidelberg whose family proprietors won't hear of him going back on the road and put him up for a week. He renewed his friendship with the son of the house, his contemporary, after their war experience on opposing sides. He had a great capacity for friendship, his last writing expressing a sense of profound gratitude. "Love to all and kindness to all friends" he wrote, "and thank you all a life of great happiness". Not a bad spirit in which we could all approach the new year, whatever it might bring.

Indeed, a time of gifts. Of course, it sometimes wasn't like that — he undoubtedly chose to remember the more fortunate meetings; and society — and the young — were probably more innocent then than now. And yet, and yet. Young people are beguiling still because of their energy, optimism, enthusiasm, and joy; because, having nothing much apart from these qualities, and nothing much to lose, they are generous in sharing them with others. Several of our religious leaders including pope Francis have urged us to be as generous as we can in responding to the generosity of the young, to help knit together bonds of mutual trust in an increasingly fractured society. So, hug a hoody, even one in a Dominican habit. You might be pleasantly surprised at the result.

Blessed chalk for Epiphany will be available on the Communion rails after each Mass today. There is a custom, in Epiphany-tide, of writing the initials of the three magi above the front door of one's house or room, along with the year. So this year we write: 20 + C + M + B + 15. As well as standing for Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, these initials are short for *Christus mansionem benedicat*, 'May Christ bless [this] dwelling'. So we're asking for the protection of Christ and his saints over our house, and at the same time make a small public profession of faith.

News from the Parish Shop. Catholic Diaries, containing also the Order of Mass, are available for £2.50 or £3, and there are plenty of calendars, either of Church Art for £1, or the Holy Cross calendar (containing photographs taken by members of the congregation) for £5.

On the fifth day of April you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ. On the seventeenth day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. On the twenty-fourth day of May, the feast of Pentecost. On the seventh day of June, the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. On the twenty-ninth day of November, the First Sunday of the Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom is honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.
