# 40 days and 40 nights

nce again, Lent seems to have come round rather quickly. It is a time to reflect on our priorities and the way we try to live our lives of faith. The number forty is a deeply biblical one which resonates with the forty days Moses spent on the mountain, learning from God, the forty years the Israelites wandered before reaching the promised land, the forty days our Lord fasted and prayed in the Judean desert. Coincidentally, it is also the number of days every year, that medieval knights were obliged to turn out for military service for their monarch. With the events surrounding the burial of the remains of Richard III, this has a strange relevance. St Bernard of Clairvaux (who came from a very combative, knightly family from Burgundy) used to enjoy using this imagery to explain what Lent was about. He said that if it is your duty to serve an earthly king for forty days a year, how much more is it your duty to give special service to the High King of Heaven for forty days a year. In one sermon, he said to his monastic brothers:

"Today, dear brethren, we enter the holy season of Lent, our Christian period of military service. In keeping it, we do not stand alone. We are united with all who hold the faith. Should not all Christians share the fast of Christ? Where the head leads, should not all the members follow?"

So, as we prepare for spiritual combat, we can ask for the powerful intercession of Our Lady, and St Bernard, and all the saints and angels. We should ask for their prayers that our Lent is fruitful and holy, so we can grow in grace and enjoy the beautiful feast of the resurrection at Easter.
