Ash Wednesday revisited

ow beginning the third week of Lent we can perhaps pause and consider how it has gone so far. Have we managed to consider and deepen our way of living as Christians, disciples of Jesus? Have we perhaps tried and faltered, falling back into our usual habits? Have we even begun? Well, there is still time — we have another four weeks to go in this season of grace.

The Ash Wednesday I want to revisit though isn't the calendar date of 3½ weeks ago, but rather the poem of the same title published in 1930 by the Anglican poet and mystic, T. S. Eliot. The work of poets serves to crystallise or distil and concentrate human experience, and this particular work is very evocative of the process of conversion, of turning back towards God, which of course applies to all of us, poets or not. It is shot through with allusions to the Incarnation, to the Blessed Virgin, and to the Wisdom of God delighting in His creation.

Eliot begins by stressing our need to realise we need to accept God's help in this:

Because I do not hope to turn again / Because I do not hope / Because I do not hope to turn.

The hope of the new life of the Resurrection held out by the risen Lord is what, through His Spirit, can energise us to reorientate our way of life, to turn back towards God.

Another set of lines Eliot thinks important enough to repeat and to bring in to the conclusion of the poem is a perfect summation of what our Lenten experience should be about:

Teach us to care and not to care / Teach us to sit still / Even among these rocks, / Our peace in ${\it His\ will.}$

Teach us to care and not to care — teach us to care for others, to respond to their needs with compassion and generosity, as we do in our practice of almsgiving, giving to others of our resources, our time, even our friendship; teach us not to care for the demands of our fragile ego and its insecurities and selfishness and fear, as we do in our fasting, whether from food or from unhealthy and unhelpful ways of living that turn us away from the gentle demands of Jesus.

Teach us to sit still — perhaps the most difficult in our frenetic world, as we come to realise that prayer is for us, largely a waste of time; a waste of time because it is not, in the end, some thing we do ourselves (though of course praying words, or the Scriptures, or contemplating a religious statue, painting or icon can help us attain a state in which we are receptive to prayer) because prayer is largely what God does in us, helping us to discern or tune in to the promptings of His Holy Spirit within our hearts, within the centre of ourselves. Prayer is our sense — however fleeting — of coming into communion with the living God, of turning away from our illusions and disordered desires and finding our peace in His will, even amidst the rocks and barren places and difficulties of our lives.

Another poet who captures something of Lent:

There's so much good in the worst of us / and there's so much ill in the best of us / that it ill behoves any of us / to talk about the rest of us.

We need to be confident and trust in God's mercy. We are by no means (usually) as bad as we think we may be in our more self-pitying or melodramatically despairing moments — another false illusion we need to get rid of; on the other hand, we all know that we could do better. Lent is a time for realism, not masochism. Mediocre disciples we may be, but yet disciples, able to turn to the Lord and seek His pardon and peace, freely given to us if only we can learn to accept it. Let's pray that we can do so in this time and go on with gladness to the great feast of the Resurrection.
