## HE ROSE FROM THE DEAD ACCORDING TO THE SCRIPTURES

n the Creed we say: 'On the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures'. This picks up the words of St Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians: 'Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures'.

There is the same stress on fulfilling the Scriptures in St Luke's story (Chapter 24) about the two disciples who are walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus. They meet Jesus on the road, but do not recognise him. And when they talk of their grief about the crucifixion of the one who they 'had hoped would redeem Israel', this 'stranger' explains to them from the Scriptures how it was 'necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and then enter into his glory'. After they had recognised him as Jesus and he had vanished from their sight, they say: 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the Scriptures to us?' They are excited and moved by being shown the pattern of God's working to overcome sin and its harmful effects among us, even though this was brought about by the seemingly unexpected way of the suffering and death of Jesus the Messiah.

Why is there this emphasis on the events of Jesus' death and resurrection being 'in fulfilment of the Scriptures'? God does not do things at random. In God's creation, events have causes and effects, and (though we cannot always see it) there is a coherent pattern in the created world and in human activities. Our own rational nature is based on the rational nature of God himself. So we can, with God's help, see this pattern being worked out, in human activities, in the life of the Church and even in the natural world.

The Resurrection is the culmination of God's plan to right the wrongs caused by man's sin. God's ways are not our ways, and we find it hard sometimes to see why God works the way he does - in small things as well as in great. But as we ponder on God's work revealed in Scripture and in the life of the Church, the coherence of his plan gradually becomes clearer. Then we can begin to see that it was 'necessary' for the Christ to suffer.

#### KING RICHARD III

The Book of Hours owned by King Richard III, and which was placed on his coffin at the reinterment ceremony, has gone on display at the New Walk Museum. Made of parchment and beautifully decorated, the Book of Hours was created in London in 1420, with handwritten prayers added for King Richard III around the time of his reign from 1483-85.

The book is a collection of prayers to guide devotion throughout the day. It includes several additional hand-written prayers for Richard's personal use, with his name attached. The date of the king's birthday also appears, which is believed to have been written in by Richard himself. One prayer reads, "Lord Jesus Christ, deign to free me, your servant King Richard, from every tribulation, sorrow and trouble in which I am placed..." As Richard's personal prayer book, it is thought it may have been in his tent at the Battle of Bosworth. It is known to have later belonged to Lady Margaret Beaufort, mother of Henry VII, before eventually being passed into the library of the Archbishop of Canterbury during the early 1600s.

The book will be on display at New Walk Museum until Sunday 28 June.
