THE KINGDOM OF GOD

n today's Gospel reading, Jesus says: 'This is what the Kingdom of God is like'. And then he tells two parables. Parables are intended to provoke us to think and respond. What thoughts do these two parables about the Kingdom of God provoke in us?

When Jesus began to proclaim the Kingdom, he said: 'The time is fulfilled and the Kingdom of God is at hand. Repent and believe the good news'. So the announcement of the Kingdom is a 'fulfilment'; it is God keeping his promise to save us from our sins, by himself coming to be with us, so that we could be with him, fully. Moreover, the Kingdom involves 'repentance' and 'believing the good news'.

Being in God's Kingdom means to accept what God offers us. It is to do with living under God's rule. Normally the word 'kingdom' refers to one particular way in which countries are governed — by 'king', rather than by a 'president' or a 'dictator'. But when we talk about the 'Kingdom of God,' we mean God's rule over us, and the way that brings us together as his one family. God is indeed our King, but not like any other kind of king. And his way of ruling is not like the kingly rule of any other earthly king. Jesus said: 'My Kingdom is not from this world'.

So when we pray: 'Thy Kingdom come', we mean: 'May God rule over us, over us all'. It means that we are praying that we will accept God's governance, so that his loving purposes for us all will more readily be achieved.

Often we cannot see why God allows certain thing to happen, and we are inclined to question his wisdom and purposes. Perhaps this is partly why Jesus tells these two parables, which speak of different aspects of the Kingdom. God's rule over us is like a man planting seed. We don't understand how God is working in us, any more than the sower understands how a seed germinates, takes root and grows into the full grain. It is all God's doing, in a quiet and hidden way. And the aim of it all is that we respond to God's rule and grow to fulfilment. The harvest time will certainly come. And the implication seems to be that though there will be a good crop, some seeds will have failed. Our lives will come to their harvest, with varied outcomes, depending on how we have responded to God's rule.

And what of the second parable? The mustard seed is tiny, but the full-grown tree is huge. And it offers hospitality to creatures that might seem to be quite alien. But God's Kingdom is offered to all people, without ironing out their differences. God's rule in salvation may seem hidden and ineffective. But by it all, He is surely and certainly working out His purposes. Trust Him.
