St Dominic

n Saturday we celebrated the feast of our founder, St Dominic. He was born in Calaruega, in the Spanish province of Castile around 1170, and died in 1221. about 6 or 7 years after he founded the Order of Preachers at Toulouse in France, in response to the need to combat the life-denying Albigensian heresy prevalent in that region. This need had dawned on him when he passed through the area as part of a diplomatic mission in 1204, following which he first founded a community of nuns at nearby Prouille in 1206, to support with their prayers and austere life those who were preaching the true gospel. It became evident to him that the preachers too needed a flexible organisation and structure, and would be driven by their mission to work in more than one diocese, which led him to found the friars or preaching brothers in 1215, whose rule and role in the universal church was eventually confirmed by pope Honorius III, who sanctioned the Dominican Order on 22nd December 1216 and endorsed its name (an Order of Preachers) and universal preaching mission on 17th January 1217. There is therefore some ambiguity — it's not black and white ... (!) - as to when exactly the Dominicans were founded, though we will celebrate the 800th anniversary largely next year and 2017. It is undisputed, however, that we beat the Franciscans whose rule Honorius did not get around to approving until 29th December 1223.

Timothy Radcliffe, the 85th successor of St Dominic as Master of the Order from 1992 to 2001 (and the only Englishman; we're currently on the 87th, Bruno Cadoré, a son of France) has described St Dominic as a man who was "stupefyingly free". That is true, but needs a bit of thought to see why. We would not, in our times, regard someone who had taken on the commitments of religious life — poverty, chastity and obedience — as being free, rather bound. But Dominic found his freedom in his love of Christ, and through that his zeal to preach the Good News: it was the freedom of the poor itinerant preacher, free to go where he was needed; the freedom to found an Order unlike any that had existed before (preaching had until then been seen as a particular charism of bishops); free to scatter the fragile little community he had gathered around him and send them to the universities, that they might be equipped for the preaching mission; and free to accept the decisions of the brothers in Chapter, even when they disagreed with him. It was, Timothy says, the freedom of the compassionate person, who dared to see and respond to the needs of the people of his time.

Dominic's followers did not develop a cult of personality around their founder, as did those of Francis. The popes, in fact, had to prompt the Order to carry through the process of Dominic's canonisation. Rather Dominic gifted us with a flexible and responsive form of government in the constitutions of the Order that frees us to respond with compassion in our time to those who hunger for the Word of God. It is this document that is placed in our hands when we offer our lives for the preaching of the gospel. We also say then that we seek "God's mercy and yours". We may move forward hesitantly, and often make mistakes, but our confidence in God's mercy, mediated in the first place through each other in the common life, gives us the confidence also to freely shape and reshape our response to the needs of our mission in our particular place and time, that the Good News might be proclaimed and people realise in joy and hope their own freedom and dignity as children of our loving Father. In doing this we carry on Dominic's vision and purpose in the church.

King Richard III. August 22nd is the anniversary of the death of Richard III, killed at the Battle of Bosworth Field 530 years ago. In this special year of his re-interment in Leicester Cathedral, a Solemn Mass will be offered for the repose of his soul here at Holy Cross at 7.15pm on Friday 21st August. Although there have been other Masses offered for King Richard this year, here in Leicester and elsewhere, this Mass will be unique in that it will be celebrated in the traditional Dominican Rite, materially unchanged since King Richard's own times. If the Dominican friars resident in Leicester in 1485 offered Mass for him on hearing the news of his death — as we may hope they did — this is the rite they would have used.

Mass intentions. You will see from the list of intentions that there are some Masses without intentions listed. You may request Masses to be offered for particular intentions (exams, jobs, thanksgiving, birthdays, anniversaries, for the dead, etc). With your request, you make an offering, called a stipend. In offering a stipend, you are not 'paying for a Mass'. Masses can't be bought and sold. You are asking for a priest's prayers. A priest, instead of praying for himself and his family at Mass, will pray for your intention. In return, your stipend pays to feed and lodge one priest for one day. In this diocese the stipend is recommended to be £10 — it must feed and house a priest for a day. Of course we will always offer Mass for your intentions if you have no money. Please therefore consider having Masses offered (How? Go to the sacristy after Mass and ask any priest). It is a good thing to have Masses offered. Remember your dead relatives, especially around their anniversaries. Remember all the things important to you — and help clothe and feed the friars in the process! Thank you.
