## LIFE, DEATH & RESURRECTION

ast week at Holy Cross was a particularly busy time. We had an ordination to the priesthood on Saturday. On Sunday we celebrated the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, our patronal festival. And on Thursday we had the funeral of a much-loved elderly member of our congregation. These three events, coming so close together, are reinforced by Jesus' words in today's Gospel: 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.'

Jesus said this about himself because he was trying to make the apostles understand that his earthly life would not end in glorious human success, but in suffering and death on a cross. That is how he shows his love and service to us all. But it was not until Christ's resurrection that they began to see why it had to be like that. The cross displays both our sinful rejection of God, and God's saving love for us all. The dedication of our church to the Holy Cross carries the same message, and stands as a similar sign to everyone.

The disciples had been arguing about which of them was the greatest. So Jesus deflates their self-importance by putting a child in front of them. In effect he says: 'Don't worry about status. God loves each of you, just as you are, even little children. So serve one another in love and simplicity.' They still did not understand, and in the next chapter of St Mark's gospel, Jesus finds he has to say it all over again, even more strongly. 'The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.' This sets the pattern for the Christian priesthood. This is how the Son of Man lived, so it is also how the priests of his Church are called to live: a life of self-sacrificing service which displays Jesus' love on the cross, shown above all in the sacrament of the Eucharist.

But Calvary was not the end. Jesus rose from the dead on the third day; and we live, and die, in the hope of sharing his resurrected life. So the Requiem Mass for William Spendilow last Thursday was offered in the sure hope that he will have forgiveness for all his sins and be welcomed into the risen life of Jesus. Though he suffered years of poor health, William always remained cheerful and hopeful. May he, and the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace.

- Dried foods: rice/ maize meal/ lentils/ cous cous/ dried fruit/ noodles/ sugar/ porridge/ flour/ pasta;
- Long life goods: cooking oil/ cereal bars/ nuts/ cereal/ crisps/ indian savoury mix/ chocolate/ biscuits;
