## Jubilees Galore!

The Sacred Scripture has lots to say about jubilees. They are times of release and favour. Old debts are passed over, and there is freedom from bondage to all kinds of problems. In many ways, they are a clear example in the Scripture of the release from servitude to sin that is encountered in our relationship with Christ.

Jubilees are going to become something that we will think about quite a bit in the year ahead. In a few short weeks, the Dominican Order will begin to celebrate its 800<sup>th</sup> Jubilee of Foundation. Throughout the world, the Order will mark this milestone - locally, nationally, and internationally bearing witness to the fact that our Order has grown in all the corners of the world over the past eight centuries, and continues to grow in many places. It is a time to give thanks for the manifestation of God's grace in the context of our Order, but also a time to pray for renewal, and for us Dominicans to reconnect in a very profound way with our original calling to this way of life, and to recognise its all-consuming demands on our lives, while recognising the joy and privilege afforded to us in our Dominican calling.

It seems to me an action of the Holy Spirit, that this Dominican Jubilee coincides with the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy that will also start in a few short weeks, on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. This Jubilee Year of Mercy is a real gift to the whole Church from our beloved Holy Father, Pope Francis. In giving it to us, he is reminding the Church and the world our the extent of the damage our sins cause, both to ourselves and to those around us. He is inviting us to confront this together, and to ask God for mercy. Asking for mercy is no laughing matter: to ask for mercy means acknowledging weakness and sinfulness, lack of strength, vulnerability. This Jubilee of Mercy is not for the faint of heart, or for the lukewarm soul. It demands courage.

There are three moments of admittance to the Dominican Order: the Clothing in the Habit; the Simple Profession of Vows; the Solemn Profession of Vows. Each of us Dominicans have encountered these three moments as we have sought entry to the Order. They have come after lived experience in the Order, and fraternal examination and reflection with our brethren. At each occasion, we have been asked the same question: "What do you seek?" And our Obedience demands the same answer: "God's Mercy and yours"; "God's Mercy and the Mercy of the Order". Each Dominican Priest has marked his journey by begging publicly for mercy from God and from his brethren. These moments are moments of jubilee - they are moments of release from the demands of the world and abandonment on the Providence of God that is demanded by the Holy Vow of Obedience that we profess. They involve a lifelong resignation, and promise an eternal freedom.

There will be many events and occasions in the coming months that will help us to think about the significance of the 800<sup>th</sup> Jubilee and the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy. Hopefully they will serve above all to remind us of the need to ask for mercy - as individuals, as members of a religious order, as a community, and as the Church. The jubilees will bring freedom, yes. But there is pain and angst at times, for the promise we hope for is not yet realised.

As we begin to journey together on this stage of our story, let's encourage each other as we face what is hard for us with what is healing for us. I would encourage you to attend the opening Mass for the Jubilee Year on Saturday 7 November at 12:30pm, and to bring all your needs to St Martin de Porres in the Novena we offer in his honour during this time. There will be a special Mass for Healing to open the Jubilee of Mercy at Immaculate Conception Oadby on 8<sup>th</sup> December to which all are invited also, and +Patrick our Bishop has begun to organise various events that we will hear about in due course. No doubt we have much to learn from each other in the coming year. No doubt we will be surprised by grace once again

**October is the month of the Holy Rosary.** Throughout October we should be thinking about our devotions, and especially the praying of the Rosary, long associated with our holy father Dominic and the Order. We pray the Rosary here at Holy Cross every day at 12 noon, except Sundays when it is at 6pm.

**November is the month in which we remember the dead.** Envelopes are available for names to go on the Dead List, and Mass will be offered every day in November for the repose of the souls of those on the Dead List. There will be a Parish Requiem in November for everyone who is on the List, and for those who have died in the last year.

This year's Advent Market will be held on Advent Sunday, 29 November. This is a very important fund-raising event and we will soon be asking for people to become involved.

The Novena to St Martin de Porres begins on Tuesday 3 November. He was a lay brother of the Dominican Order who was beatified in 1837 and canonized in 1962. He is a powerful intercessor for many needs and intentions. There will be a book available for you to list your intentions.

**Pastoral Core Group.** Thanks to the generosity of a number of parishioners, we are setting up this group which will communicate and discuss matters to do with the parish chaplaincies and apostolates. Please keep the group in your prayers.

MONEY MATTERS: Last Weekend's collections - Offertory Collection £998,41 (of which £303.65 was Gift Aided and £694.76 was not), and in addition the parish receives approximately £240 per week in donations made by standing order, nearly all of which are Gift Aided: Solidarity Fund £3.32: Friends of Holy Cross £13.27: Holy Souls £26.15: Grenada Church Restoration £ - . The collection for Home Mission Sunday came to £294.21.

This week there is a retiring collection for World Mission Sunday. Every year the needs of the Church in the Missions grow - as new dioceses are formed, as new seminaries are opened, as areas devastated by war or natural disaster are rebuilt, and as other areas, long suppressed, are opening up to hear the message of Christ and His Church. That is why the involvement and commitment of Catholics from around the world is so urgently needed.

Next week there is a retiring collection for the Universities Chaplaincy, and Gift Aid tax refunds will be devoted to the Parish. George Ralph has been appointed the Lay Chaplain.

2016 marks the 800th anniversary of the approval of the Order of Preachers. The Jubilee Year begins on Saturday 7 November, the Feast of All Saints of the Dominican Order. There will be a special Mass at 12.30pm followed by refreshments. There will be a variety of activities to mark the Jubilee, and there will be more information in due course.

Safeguarding. From the beginning of November until Advent Sunday there will be a systematic and thorough review of our practices. All DBS (Disclosure & Barring Service) certificates will be checked, and there will be a tightening of procedures across the parish and our apostolates.

Organ Recital. Our Director of Music, Mr Thomas Keogh, will be giving a recital here on Wednesday 28 October at 7.30pm. It is the first of a series, and will be in aid of the music ministry at Holv Cross.
