# Christ has already won the victory

t. Mark's Gospel and today's 2nd Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews look at Christ's work of salvation from two very different perspectives. Mark tells us that that will only be completed when Christ finally comes in glory to gather us into God's kingdom. Considered from our human, temporal point of view, that will be at some future unknown date.

But today's passage from the Letter to the Hebrews looks at salvation from Christ's eternal perspective, which is an everlasting 'now,' not a temporal sequence. From that perspective Christ has already completed his work of salvation. That he achieved through sacrificing Himself on the cross. Through that single sacrifice He gained the forgiveness of all our sins. He needs to do nothing more to achieve our salvation. He has already achieved His goal and has entered into glory with His heavenly Father. Now He sits enthroned, triumphant, in God's kingdom. In the eternal now He rejoices in the defeat of all God's enemies, through the victory. which he has already won on the cross. That victory is already guaranteed.

But what about us, who live in the dimension of time, not of eternity? We may well wonder, if Christ has already won the victory against evil, how can there be so much sin and suffering in the world? We know only too well that we can and do sin. Our personal salvation is by no means certain. This doesn't mean that Christ has failed and that there is more for Him to do. What it does mean is that with God's help we must embrace the salvation Christ has already gained for us. But He won't and can't force us to love Him.

St. Luke's Gospel expresses this very poignantly, 'Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!'

But none of us can draw close to God without His help. So the Letter to the Hebrews tells us that Christ, the eternal priest, constantly prays for us. More than this, at each Mass Christ renews the unique sacrifice of Himself, made on the cross for the salvation of the world. When we come to Mass and enter into its spirit we make our own the salvation, which Christ has already gained for us on the cross. And we are nourished by the Body and Blood of our crucified and risen Lord. That gives us the strength to die to sin and rise to new life in Christ.

The perspective of the Letter to the Hebrews is very encouraging! We can so easily become depressed by so much evil in the world, and fear that Christ has failed. But this letter assures us that Christ has already won the victory. He's done all that is necessary. He's given us all that we need. All that remains is for the salvation He has already gained for us on the cross to become a reality in each of our lives.
