# Brigid Brings the Spring!

have always disliked January, and so I continue to hold fast to the Irish tradition that the first day of February is the first day of Spring! It is said that this day was in ancient times kept as the Day of Welcoming for Spring by the ancient Celts. It is also the Feast of St Brigid, Patroness of Ireland. One of the many legends told of St Brigid is that she was the druidess of a temple dedicated to the Celtic goddess of the same name, and converted the temple into a Christian monastery.

The following day, Candlemas, is the day when our Nativity scenes are put away. Forty days have passed since Christmas, and these have been days when the light has been precious. The blessing of candles on this day reminds us how important it is to be illuminated in the darkness, and as we begin to look forward for the extra daylight that is promised by the springtime, we hope that the season of Lent which will soon be upon us will be a time of light and grace in all of our lives.

This year, we have been particularly blessed to have the beautiful Nativity scene outside our church, on New Walk. So many people have stopped to comment on it and pray there. Later this week, it will depart for storage until next Advent. It was very moving to stand there on Christmas Eve, following the Vigil Mass, and sing carols with all our families. How distressing it was, just some days later, when parishioners and friars found the shattered remains of the Christ Child. So many people have sent messages of sorrow and regret.

The shattered pieces of the Christ figure remind me of the many children whose lives are shattered through abuse, neglect, violence, conflict, and other things of the sort. Our cruelty and inhumanity to one another is brought home to us most profoundly when we see children suffer. How many of us were moved to action some months ago when we saw the images of the drowned child on the beach, his parents having taken huge risk that he might know a better life.

The days of springtime ahead bring the assurance that things are getting better. It may be true that "we don't get great summers these days", but a dreary day in July is never as bad as in January. The season of Christmas having passed, we are all invited to embrace the promise of a better life through the season of Lent that lies ahead.

So as our nativity scenes are put away, let's pray that we will all be converted to live a better life. And let's remember all those whose lives have been shattered or damaged. Dwelling with us in our most extreme brokenness is the broken Body of Christ.
