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THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE 24TH SUNDAY

1ST READING: AMOS 8:4-7

Amos reminds the people that not only correct belief, but correct action is part of living an authentic life of faith. As the Catechism reminds us, we must never defraud the laborers of their wages.

2ND READING: TIMOTHY 2:1-8

Here Paul expresses the beautiful teaching that God wishes everyone to be saved. Human society is itself good, despite the many evils that afflict it. We should pray and work to improve it, not hatch schemes of destruction.

GOSPEL READING: LUKE 16:1-13

It takes a sort of single-mindedness to stay on the way of salvation. Just as the dishonest steward focused all his energies on saving his skin, so we must focus all our energies, even among the trial of this world, on reaching a blessed eternity.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

A DOMINICAN ROAD MAP - DEVOTION TO MISSION

Fr David continues his series of reflections on the Dominican way of life, inspired by the 800th Jubilee of our Order and the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

The final Pillar of Dominican Life that we need to consider is Mission. As I described a few weeks ago, the edifice of Dominican Life needs to be sturdy. What we have considered already looks good on the basis of our three other pillars – prayer, study, community. The final column completes the symmetry. And it is this very word, symmetry, that is necessary when we consider Dominican devotion to Mission.

Dominican preaching makes no sense if it is not missionary. Unless the Preacher understands himself to be called to the service of others, and to devote himself entirely to this calling, he is doomed to failure. His whole life is ordered in this way, and the path he follows only makes sense in this context. But the Dominican is so engrossed with the other tasks placed upon him that he may struggle for time for this ministry. Except that he must realise that the demands made of him, and the life that he leads, is itself a mission. Dominican Life lived well is a most beautiful sermon, a full and rich act of preaching, a devoted service to the Church.

Beginning in mercy, and sustained by charity, the Dominican Preacher is invited into a constant contemplation of God. In every aspect of his life, he experiences that. God's love is constantly demonstrated to the Preacher in a variety of ways, and the life to which he is called demands a constant reflection on that wonderful reality. A life lived in this way makes preaching, mission, an imperative. In prayer, he has learned to taste God's mercy and experience his share in God's intimacy. He has studied that experience, recognising God's action in the lives of others and in the beauty of creation. In community he has put his experience and learning into action. In all of these moments, he has been faithful to his mission, bringing what he has received to others. This kind of holy life is a privilege for him, and through it God has enabled the Preacher to be greater than himself, to be a chosen instrument of salvation for the world.

It is a wonderful life. But it is lived in a hostile world. Preaching can be exhausting, especially when it is ignored. And because Dominican Preaching is not something that can be left aside, it demands constant attention. There are no holidays from being a Dominican – even when there are times of rest and regeneration, they are ordered to preaching and are moments of mission also. It is all too easy to be discouraged, and to stop preaching. To give it up is to step off the Dominican way. Yet there are so many temptations to do so, too many reasons why it might seem futile. This is why the pillars are so important, because there is always sustenance in prayer, in study, and in community. There are always new reasons to be found, consolations to be shared. There is the constant presence of God. There is a deep well from which we drink and know refreshment.

Dominican life is a great joy and privilege. Our devotion to mission means we have to share that with others, and that is a real grace, a true gift. It is by the example of our lives that we preach God's mercy. That's not terrifying, it's uplifting. The cracks in our person that need God's mercy allow it to be demonstrated in our lives, and to offer our constant conversion as a service to others. Let's follow this Dominican path together, in our own ways. It can only lead to beauty.
