

THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

1ST READING: ISAIAH 11:1-10

The prophet has a vision of peace built upon justice. No human agency can bring this about, no political hero, religious leader, nor ideology, only God through the Messiah, the Root of Jesse, who is Jesus himself.

2ND READING: ROMANS 15:4-9

Here in a very important passage Paul reaffirms the validity of the Old Testament, states that Christ was explicitly promised to the patriarchs (Abraham, Joseph and his sons etc.) and that the gentiles were always part of this saving plan.

GOSPEL READING: MATTHEW 3:1-12

It is probable that John came from a priestly, messianic monastic community, and his years of fasting and praying in the monastic desert were a preparation of this great moment, as the quote from Isaiah suggests; when he identifies Jesus as the divine Messiah.

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 11:2-10

Part of the priestly element in John the Baptist's own life was to identify the external High Priest, Jesus Christ. John probably never sacrificed under the Old Law in the Temple in Jerusalem, but his whole life was a living sacrifice of praise and witness. This culminated in the giving of his own life to bear witness to "The Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world."

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

2^{ND} WEEK OF ADVENT

As we enter the Season of Advent, Fr Fabian will reflect with us on the meaning of this special time, and the readings we hear at Mass each week.

The fine but frosty days we had during the past week may have reminded us of the pause at the year's turning that I mentioned last week. They offered us the stillness we need to reflect on the end of the old and the start of the new. This is not just to do with dates and weather, but with our own lives. We need to take some time out, to reflect on what really matters, on where we are going, and on what our lives are about. This is what the season of Advent gives us, as we see from today's Gospel reading.

John the Baptist's message for the people who came to him was: 'Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand'. And notice that he is making this call 'in the wilderness of Judea', not in the towns and villages of Palestine. This 'wilderness' is on the edge of the great stretch of desert which lies between fertile Palestine and the rich country of Babylonia between the great rivers of the Tigris and the Euphrates. It is an empty quarter between two rich areas of civilization. Hardly anyone lives there, even now, when motor roads cross it.

So it is remarkable that people 'from Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan' went out to hear him. They were ready to leave the comforts of their homes and go out into the desert to hear the message of John the Baptist. But they came not merely to hear it, but to respond, by being baptised as a sign that they were determined to live in expectation of God's salvation coming to them through His Messiah.

The gospel writer quotes the prophet Isaiah: 'The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord'. Isaiah wrote this when the Israelites were returning, unexpectedly, from their exile in Babylon. That was one particular historical moment, when God rescued his people from the Babylonian captivity, just as he had much earlier rescued them from slavery in Egypt. But now we are not simply remembering something that happened in the past. The gospel writer sees these happenings as events which foreshadowed God's final, definitive salvation which Jesus has given us through his life, death and resurrection, and which John the Baptist was preaching.

So, during Advent we are like those people who went out to listen to John. We need to listen: to the prayers and the Scripture readings at the Mass, and to the homily. Each year we have the opportunity to hear again the promise of God that he would come to save us. But we are not like those who listened to John. For us, the Kingdom of heaven is not just 'at hand'. It became truly present in Jesus, in his life, death and resurrection. We share in it now, truly but still in a semi-hidden way, by faith, prayer and the sacraments, and in our lives of love and service to others. And we look forward in hope to the fulfilment of it all, in God's good time.
