THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK



READINGS FOR THE 16TH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

1ST READING GENESIS 18:01-10

This important incident in Genesis is often referred to as "the Hospitality of Abraham." Here Abraham is mysteriously visited by three figures out of nowhere. Abraham then addresses them as if they were one person. This is beautifully interpreted as a mysterious prefiguring of the doctrine of the Trinity. It is depicted in a famous icon by Ivan Rublev.

2ND READING COLOSSIANS 1:24-28

St Paul refers to the mysteries of God which are now made available to all. In the Old Testament, some people were granted a vision of the full reality of God and the plan for Salvation (John 8:56). Now that God himself has come in the flesh, these saving truths are preached openly; the hope of our glory.

GOSPEL READING LUKE 10:38-42

Echoing the Abraham reading, God in the flesh is given hospitality by Martha and Mary. Our Lord teaches that while it is good to be busily active in God's service, it is also necessary to be quietly attentive to the lord. "Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

DOMINICAN RITE MASS, IX SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

EPISTLE ROMAN 10:06-13

St Paul gives two great teachings in the Epistle. Firstly, the things that happened to the Israelites were "tupos" (type/figure): an image of a reality to be fulfilled in the time of the incarnation. Secondly, temptation is sure to come in our lives, but God always gives us the necessary grace to overcome it, if we are willing.

GOSPEL LUKE 16:41-47

Our Lord foretells the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 AD. In the meantime, he emphasizes the holiness of the Temple, until his mission is accomplished, and the general principle that it is important to keep holy places holy. Our Lord also reveals the fullness of his humanity, he weeps and he is angry, real human emotions, but with no hint of the fallen-ness of our human nature.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

THE SIXTH CORPORAL WORK OF MERCY: VISITING PRISONERS

If we all tried to visit those in prison, the service would be overwhelmed by our numbers. But that doesn't mean that this work of mercy has nothing to do with the majority of Christ's followers. We can all visit and help the criminal through our prayers, concern and compassion. Compassion for the justly convicted and imprisoned criminals certainly doesn't mean denying their guilt, which may be serious. But there's more to them that. They are fellow human beings, with basic inalienable rights. More than that, God has made them in His own image and likeness. Their offences may well have damaged and distorted that image, so that we can hardly recognise it.

But God can. He loves each of His children with an everlasting love and compassion. His mercy has the resilience to stand by us, to want to restore the distorted image of Himself. God never gives up on anybody, however badly he has behaved. Instead, Jesus is the expert scavenger. What others would dismiss as worthless He wants to rescue and repair. His loving mercy can transform what had become ugly and distorted into something worthwhile and even beautiful.

That is the 'mind of Christ' –His approach; that must be the mind of His followers. That is the message we have been called to embrace and spread. We can strive to influence the way criminals are considered and treated. No one must be trapped in guilt. God calls even the greatest of sinners to repentance and forgiveness. That should restore his lost dignity and self-respect. God's mercy enables the repentant criminal to make a fresh start, even though he may spend the rest of his life behind bars. God's mercy gives hope of eternal happiness and fulfilment to someone who had been written off as a complete and wicked failure.

Prison chaplains play a vital role in the exercise of this corporal work of mercy. They represent and communicate the Church's concern and compassion. Through them the whole Christian community reaches out to the imprisoned and visits them. The whole Church can and must support prison chaplains, especially with our prayers both for them and for the prisoners they visit. Our prayers can also help the prisoner's families and friends not to give up on those who are dear to them, not to stop visiting them. Their faith in him will help him to believe in himself and have hope. This must be carried through once he's discharged from prison. He's done his time and deserves a chance to make a fresh start. He needs the whole community to support his rehabilitation. Otherwise he will be trapped in quilt, driven to despair and forced into further crime.

Jesus never gave up on anyone; for Him no one was beyond hope. In fact sinners, including criminals, were the very people He came to save. Jesus could identify with the crook. He knew what it was like to be arrested, tried, convicted and punished. He carried the guilty burden of all our sins. He was executed between two criminals and gave the repentant thief hope of forgiveness and eternal happiness. And that we must do, as we help the criminal, those close to him and the whole of society not to write off the imprisoned crook as a worthless loser, a no-hoper. God, who knows us better than we could possibly know ourselves, has given even the worst of us hope of restoration and renewal. Sharing that conviction, praying for all involved in the penal system, can be our way of reaching out to the prisoner when we can't make a face to face visit. He needs our support.
