READINGS FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

1ST READING: ISAIAH 2:1-5

Isaiah sees the Temple of Jerusalem being exalted, and being visited by God himself. This is fulfilled in Christ, who is the Law who goes out from Zion, and the Word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

2ND READING: ROMANS 13:11-14

Light is always associated with God in the sacred scriptures. With the coming of Christ in the Incarnation, we are living in one long day of the Lord. Jesus himself is the Light of the World. We should try and live up to the luminous integrity he shows us.

GOSPEL READING: MATTHEW 24:37-44

The Son of Man has already come once, at an hour that no-one expected, when he took flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary. He will come again at the end of time, to judge the living and the dead.

GOSPEL: LUKE 21:25-33

People have often said that Our Lord was wrong about the passing of the generation and the second coming of Christ. However, as the Fathers teach us, "generation" can stand for great periods of time in biblical language. Think of the generation from Adam and Eve until the flood. Since the Incarnation, we are all living in the last generation, looking for the coming of the Lord.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

ADVENT

As we enter the Season of Advent, Fr Fabian will reflect with us on the meaning of this special time, and the readings we hear at Mass each week.

Well, here we are, almost at the end of November. The turn of the year is not far away, the days are getting shorter and the nights longer. The temperature is dropping, and we dread the possibility of a cold, frosty and snowy winter. We can feel the year drawing to a close; then there will be a pause of stillness before new life, light and warmth gradually begins to return. The end of one year is also the beginning of the next.

This is the season of Advent, a time when we look forward, but when we are very much aware of the present and the past. The Scripture readings for today show this.

In the first reading, Isaiah takes a long look forward, to the 'days to come' when God will finally establish his Kingdom, which he calls Mount Zion, or Jerusalem. All the nations of the world will flock to it, to worship God, to know his ways and walk in his paths. It will be a time of peace and justice: no swords, only ploughshares, a time of perfect fulfilment for all. He uses images from his own time to describe what God will bring about in the ultimate future.

But Paul and Jesus, in the other two readings, are taking a much shorter view. They are writing about the present, and how we should live now. Paul says 'the time has come', that is, the time of Jesus, when God's final salvation through Jesus' life, death and resurrection is on offer to us all. So, he urges us all to live steadily in the light and life of Christ. And Jesus warns us to be ready for what he calls the 'coming of the Son of Man'. And by this he means not just some moment in the future, but also His being present continually with us – which is real, even when we often do not realise it.

So, he urges us 'to be aware'. In the time of Noah, he says, people went about their ordinary business, unaware of the impending future, so they were unprepared for the flood which swept them all away. The 'coming of the Son of Man' is a crisis hanging over us, but far more important than the flood. Some will be ready for it, some will not. It's like two men working in the fields, or two women grinding corn together. Their work is the same, but one will be ready and the other will not. You never know when the burglar will break in. If you are not prepared, you will suffer the consequences. It's a rather grim message. But the vision that the prophet Isaiah offers, will give assurance and hope. And Jesus has promised to be with us, to the end, if we keep ourselves open to him.
