# THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

### READINGS FOR THE $23^{RD}$ SUNDAY

### 1<sup>ST</sup> READING: WISDOM 9:13-18

To our great relief Sacred Scripture admits that things can get very complicated! So we must not be disheartened if we can't work things out. It also tells us the good news that God gives us wisdom, by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, to accept His revelation, and to help our ignorance and perplexity.

### 2<sup>ND</sup> READING: PHILEMON 1:9-10, 12-17

In a very personal tone, Paul intercedes for Onesimus, who appears to be a run-away slave, who has also been baptized. Paul is carrying out his own advice to others: "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

### GOSPEL READING: LUKE 14:25-33

Primarily, this Gospel passage is directed towards those who are called to the celibate priesthood or the religious life. By extension, it reminds us all that even family ties can legitimately be left behind, if they are genuine *hindrance* to salvation. The word 'hate' here sounds very shocking, but a certain exaggeration was part of the speech world that Jesus lives in.

### DOMINICAN RITE MASS, XVI SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

### EPISTLE: EPHESIANS 3:13-21

In this very dense passage, St Paul manages to include all the main points of the Faith. The Blessed Trinity, Incarnation, indwelling of the Holy Spirit, Church, faith, works, prayer. It also confirms the concept and language of God as Father, and thus the concept of human fatherhood.

### GOSPEL: LUKE 14:1-14

St Francis de Sales always taught that humility was the fourth, but foundational, branch of the spiritual cross, the others being poverty, obedience and chastity. Here our Lord teaches us both the necessity and wisdom of humility. It has a certain spiritual canniness.

## THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

### A DOMINICAN ROAD MAP – ASSIDUOUS IN STUDY

Fr David continues his series of reflections on the Dominican way of life, inspired by the 800<sup>th</sup> Jubilee of our Order and the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

The path marked out by St Dominic invites us to speak only to God or of God. For this reason the Dominican must be constant in prayer, both in his personal routine and in his devotion to the Horarium, the daily timetable of the Community. But prayer can be lonely! How often people reflect on this, and are overburdened by the aridity that we can experience in prayer. When this comes over us, it is easy to abandon our efforts to engage in prayer through discouragement. In so doing, we begin to misunderstand God, and lose sight of the beauty of his Divine Plan for us. A sense of hopelessness, a spiritual and moral listlessness, can become contagious.

St Dominic recognised this in the course of his ministry. It was because there were philosophies and theories about God, his divine life, and the glory of creation, that diminished the sanctity of our humanity, that St Dominic realised the need to embark on his preaching mission. There would need to be some method of processing, reflecting upon, and presenting, what were the fruits of contemplation, in order to treasure them and heal the spiritual malaise that was so dangerous.

St Dominic therefore recast the emphasis of monastic wisdom for his new band of followers. Rather than see the beauty of God's creation through dedicated work on the land, he committed them to assiduous study of God's Word as shown forth in Christ and in the beauty of creation. Dominican study is assiduous – constant, and in-depth – in order to savour the fruits of contemplation, to see God's mercy in action through our lives and the whole of creation, and to sustain both personal and communal prayer and reflection, maintaining that constant communication with God that is found in prayer. Every different facet of God's creation expresses something of his glory. In Dominican study, this is sought out assiduously, cherished in contemplation, and placed at the service of others.

Each Dominican is called to a lifelong devotion to assiduous study, in the privacy of his cell, in the context of his community, and in his participation in the mission. He must build on the gift of the teaching he received in his early years in the Order, a system of education devised and refined by Dominican ways of thinking over eight centuries, to know God more deeply and preach his word more readily. In the course of his life, the Dominican may specialise in one or other particular aspect of study, both to develop a more intimate knowledge of it and to contribute something of value to it. In so doing he plays his own part in the development of the traditions of our Order, sustaining both his own Dominican calling and the lives of the brethren.

In the context of the life of every Christian, the gift of Dominican study may be considered as something of great value. Each of us requires sustenance in the life of prayer, and guidance on our moral path. A deeper understanding of the mystery of God, shared and developed with others and reflecting on what is true, provides a firm foundation on which to rely when things are dark and difficult. Through study, our prayer is enriched, our faith made firm. It no longer relies merely on ideas that occur to us in our minds or feelings that overcome us when we try to reach God. It rests on something that has been firmly established, and can be treasured as beautiful and true.
