

THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE 28TH SUNDAY

1ST READING: KINGS 5:14-17

In this beautiful incident from the Old Testament, Elisha the great prophet, cures Naaman the Syrian. The effect of this, as well as the healing of Naaman's body, is the turning of his mind and heart to the one true God of Israel. There is Spiritual health created, as well as physical.

2ND READING: TIMOTHY 2:8-13

The baptism theme is continued: if we die sacramentally with Christ in Baptism, then we shall be resurrected to reign with him in glory. Baptism is the first sign and instrument of our election, but we must be careful not to lose the relationship set up by it; "If we disown him, he will disown us."

GOSPEL READING: LUKE 17:11-19

Reflecting the first reading, the anonymous Samaritan is the only one who returns to thank Our Lord for his miraculous healing. Our Lord's gift of physical healing also brought him the greater gift of faith. Note how Jesus insists that they show themselves to the priests; no religious radicalism there then.

DOMINICAN RITE MASS: XXI SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

EPISTLE: EPHESIANS: 6:10-17

St Paul reminds us that there are spiritual realities which are opposed to the Kingdom of God. We are all called by the Our Lord to participate in this spiritual warfare, knowing that with him as our King, we can be victorious.

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 18:23-35

"Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." This parable graphically illustrates the petition of the Our Father. There is also a brief reference to Purgatory in the closing verses.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

3RD SPIRITUAL WORK OF MERCY – ADMONISHING THE SINNER

Our Twin Clarke Team return for their series on the Spiritual Works of Mercy as the Jubilee Year draws to a close.

This series will be interspersed with reflections from Fr Greg on some of the Dominican Mystics.

Most of us hate having to correct someone. We fear that will create resentment and tension for the sake of a peace we're tempted to keep quiet.

But to fail to admonish the sinner (the 3rd Spiritual Work of Mercy) would show a serious lack of love and concern for the eternal salvation of one of God's children, for our brother or sister in Christ. Love demands that we should protect them from ruining their lives, when a timely warning could save them. St. James' letter tells us, "... he who turns a sinner from the error of his way will save his soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins," (James. 5. 20).

To avoiding confrontation for the sake of peace can be a sign of not really caring for those we claim to love. With every good parent we have to admit that the 'tough love' of admonishing the wrong-doer is difficult and painful for everyone. God knows we need to pray for prudence in giving advice; we also need to ask the Holy Spirit to touch the minds and hearts of those we are trying to help.

For me the best approach to correcting the sinner is to be found first in Jesus' graphic image of removing the plank and the splinter from someone's eye. Here He condemns our eagerness to correct other people's minor faults, especially when we are blind to our own major sins, (cf. Matt.7. 3-5).

So, before pointing out other people's lesser faults we must first recognise and correct our own greater ones. As we correct the sinner we must show him the same understanding and compassion as we hope to receive from God and those we have offended. That's very important for us priests when hearing confession.

Next, In the story of the woman taken in adultery Jesus shows the compassion we need when correcting the sinner, (cf. Jn. 8. 2-11). Instead of condemning her to death, as the Law required, He challenged any of her accusers, who was without sin, to cast the first stone. As He began to write in the dust, presumably a list of their sins, they all slipped away. Jesus then told the woman that He, too, would not condemn her. Not that He denied her sin, but in sparing her life and telling her to go and sin no more, He gave her the chance to make a fresh start. That's real compassionate, healing 'tough love!'

That's what this Spiritual Work of Admonishing the Sinner is all about. And that's the point St. Paul makes in his 2nd Letter to the Corinthians. After realising the difficulties and dangers in trying to correct the Corinthians, he concludes, "I am writing these things which the lord gave me FOR BUILDING UP AND NOT FOR TEARING DOWN," (2 Cor. 13. 10).)
