

THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE 30TH SUNDAY

1ST READING: ECCLESIATICUS 35:12-14, 16-19

In our age of a toxic cult of celebrity, it is encouraging to hear that God couldn't care less about how rich or famous someone is, or how many implants or designer shoes they have. God creates all people, and each of us are loved by Him. Humility is a much more attractive trait than pride.

2ND READING: TIMOTHY 4:6-8, 16-18

Paul seems to be facing his final trial and possible martyrdom. We can pray that one day we can make his words our own: "I have fought the good fight; I have run the race: I have kept the faith." We should all pray for the gift of final perseverance.

GOSPEL READING: LUKE 18:9-14

Picking up on the first reading, it is the humility of the tax collector which is more realistic, more honest, and more in tune with the way things are, and therefore more attractive. The Pharisee indeed lives a good live, but his self-regarding attitude seems to spoil his genuine attempt at holiness.

DOMINICAN RITE MASS: XXXI SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

EPISTLE: PHILIPPIANS3:17-21; 4:1-3

St Paul talks about the second coming of Our Lord and of the resurrection of the body; a fundamental article of faith in Christian Doctrine.

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 9:18-26

The physical presence of Christ is so great that even his garments can mediate salvation, if he is approached with faith. This physical availability of the Lord is prolonged not only in the Sacraments of the Church, but also in her Sacramentals, which are like the hem of the clothing of the Body of Christ.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

5TH SPIRITUAL WORK OF MERCY - TO FORGIVE OFFENCES WILLINGLY

Our Twin Clarke Team return for their series on the Spiritual Works of Mercy as the Jubilee Year draws to a close.

This series will be interspersed with reflections from Fr Greg on some of the Dominican Mystics.

In the cult film 'Love Story' the heroine rapturously exclaims, "Love means never having to say 'sorry." And I reply, "Sentimental rubbish!"

Why? Because experience tells us that we're all sinners and sometimes hurt each other. Real love means being able to apologise when we've harmed someone, and forgive when we've been hurt. Our love for each other must reflect God's steadfast love, which is always eager to forgive the repentant sinner. Without that resilience it will be brittle and break.

To forgive is hard enough; to do so willingly –that's really difficult! Yet that's what the 5th Spiritual Work of Mercy expects of us. But forgiving those who hurt us is the most God-like of the Works of Mercy. Mercy is the very Face of God, in whose image we have been made. That means we must be as merciful as our heavenly Father is merciful!

But that goes against our natural instinct to retaliate. If we don't, we fear we will appear weak and the aggressor will continue his violence. But if we retaliate the situation will probably escalate. The innocent person will become as hostile as the one who started the violence. Nothing will be solved, and we may say and do things which we later regret.

So Jesus takes a different, two pronged, approach, aimed at defusing a hostile situation. Firstly, we should correct the offender (3^{rd} Spiritual Work of Mercy). Next, we should forgive him or her. That's the present, 5^{th} Work of Mercy.

But we do find it very hard to forgive when we've been badly hurt. We really want to forgive, but unwanted anger and resentment can suddenly flare up, sometimes long after the injury. Although our forgiving has been genuine, the wounds we suffered are still raw. We need to pray for inner healing.

To help us, Jesus urges us not only to love our enemies, instead of hating them, but also to pray for them. That's not a pious after-thought, but an essential part in healing a dysfunctional relationship. As we pray for our enemies our attitude towards them changes. We cease to wish them harm and want only their good. That gradually heals our anger and desire for vengeance. As we pray for those who are hostile to us, we ask God to heal their aggression. Only when hatred has been removed from both the aggressor and the victim can there be real peace.

Jesus has given us the supreme example of what forgiving willingly means. He not only preached a Gospel of forgiveness, but lived it, above all, on the cross. As He prayed for the forgiveness of those responsible for His

Death He showed us what it means, in practice, to forgive our enemies.
