Things are different than they were before, and our work together at the Assembly has enabled a space in our community for God to show us his loving-kindness. It is my hope that, during Advent, we might work and pray together to prepare a place for the Lord to demonstrate his mercy in our community.

Be intent on prayer, and whatever may happen will turn to our good.

THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE 34TH SUNDAY

1ST READING: MALACHI 3:19-20

As we near the end of the Church's liturgical year the readings direct our thoughts to the end of all to the end of all time and the day of Judgement. For some it will be a disaster, for others, their moment of glory.

2ND READING: THESSALONIANS 3:7-12

The common good is one of the main elements in our social and political lives. St Paul reminds us that those who are capable should work to maintain themselves and contribute to the general good of society.

GOSPEL READING: LUKE 21:5-19

Despite the certainty of the end, the Lord teaches us not to speculate too much about it, or believe those who say they know the day and the hour. Everything is accomplished in God's own time and not ours. In the meanwhile, we have plenty to do bearing witness to Christ. We might spare a thought here for our fellow Christians in the Middle East, who bear such moving witness to their faith in Christ.

DOMINICAN RITE MASS: 7TH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

EPISTLE: THESSALONIANS 1:2-10

Once again St Paul mentions one of his favorite themes: The Theological Virtues. Here Paul rejoices that the Thessalonians have embraced the Gospel so wholeheartedly, and they themselves now bear witness to it.

GOSPEL: MATTHEW 13:31-35

"Nothing great has great beginnings", is an old saying that resonates with today's Gospel. Even the pagan poets noted this general rule, *crescit occult velut arbor aevo* (Horace Odes 1:12). One of the signs of the Church's holiness is her small beginnings and eventual flourishing throughout the world. As a one-time Prior, of Holy Cross, Fr Vincent McNabb, used to say: "The best proof of the acorn is the oak."

EPILOGUE TO THE WORKS OF MERCY - FAMILY LIFE AND THE WORKS OF MERCY

Our Twin Clarke Team return for their series on the Spiritual Works of Mercy as the Jubilee Year draws to a close. This series will be interspersed with reflections from Fr Greg on some of the Dominican Mystics.

Now that we've concluded our reflections on each of the Works of Mercy I'm going to suggest that in our homes there are plenty of opportunities for each of us to put them into practice. We can all give a helping hand around the house. We can all show an interest in how different members of the family have spent the day. This calls for loving sensitivity and compassion, as we make time for each other.

But even in the most loving of families we sometimes tread on each other's toes –hopefully accidentally. We sometimes say and do things, which hurt those closest to us. If so, God expects us to apologise for the pain we have caused, and forgive those who have hurt us. Without the resilience of mercy family life will be so brittle it will fall apart.

In our families, there are many opportunities for us to be God's voice in comforting, encouraging and teaching. Through our hands He heals the sick, clothes the naked and feeds the hungry. Such activities cause us to reach out unselfishly to others in their need -to be generous givers of ourselves.

Sometimes we will have to care for a sick member of the family. When there's a death in the family we will need to draw, close and comfort each other. It's so important that we should pray for each other, preferably together.

Loving care for our nearest and dearest should come naturally. But as we share in God's own infinite love and compassion what seems trivial and transitory assumes an eternal value. We become God's channels and ministers of mercy!

There's a great need for us to make quality time to enjoy each other's company, to listen to each other's joys and sorrows. No one should be allowed to feel neglected and lonely. And yet we can become so absorbed in electronic gadgetry, that we literally have no time for each other. Such indifference can spell the death of family life!

Learning to be compassionate and considerate in the home should inspire us to respond to the needs of those in the 'outside world' -the work place, school, or playground, people suffering severe hardship in distant lands. Pope Francis sees a desperate need for us to overcome the modern evil of what he calls, 'globalized indifference' to the needs and feelings of others.

Let us start in the home to undermine this 'globalized indifference' and reach out to the world through the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy! They are meant to provide a programme for action, not just a subject for pious reflection.
