THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

READINGS FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

1ST READING: ISAIAH 35:1-6,10

Courage, mentioned here by Isiah, is one of the four cardinal virtues we need to live lives of integrity (the other three bring prudence, justice and temperateness). It helps us overcome the difficulties of this life, but the reward is great, as it is God himself.

2ND READING: JAMES 5:7-10

St James stresses both God's patience and how we should reflect it in our own lives. The fact that the day of judgement has not come yet does not mean it won't come. St Peter elsewhere stresses the positive aspect of the time we have left: "And remember, our Lord's patience gives people time to be saved."

GOSPEL READING: MATTHEW 11:2-11

Part of the priestly element in John the Baptist's own life was to identify the external High Priest, Jesus Christ. John probably never sacrificed under the Old Law in the Temple in Jerusalem, but his whole life was a living sacrifice of praise and witness. This culminated in the giving of his own life to bear witness to "The Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world." The expected Christ was also known as "The One who is to come."

DOMINICAN RITE MASS:

EPISTLE: PHILIPPIANS 4:4-7

Today is *Gaudete* Sunday, and the Epistle continues this theme of joy. True joy is born out of the theological virtue of hope. Despite the trials and tribulations of this world, our true joy is the eternity that awaits us.

GOSPEL: JOHN 1:19-28

St John the Baptist makes it clear that he is merely the forerunner of the divine Messiah. John's baptism was a symbol of repentance only, for only Christ could institute a Baptism which cleanses from sin and conforms us to Himself.

THE WORD AT WORK: OUR WEEKLY REFLECTION

3RD WEEK OF ADVENT – THE COMING OF OUR GOD

During the Season of Advent, Fr Fabian reflects on the meaning of this special time, and the readings we hear at Mass.

We are now half way through Advent, and we are looking forward more actively to Christmas. The word 'Advent' means 'coming', and during Advent we think particularly about is Jesus's birth in Bethlehem. But this is only part of what we mean by the 'coming of Christ'. We say in the Creed: 'He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His Kingdom will have no end'. That is his 'Second Coming', the final winding up of the present creation and the appearing of 'the new heavens and new earth', which we have been promised. But what about the time in between? That too is part of the time of his 'coming', but in the sense of his being continuously present with us through faith and grace, in prayer and the sacraments, in our love and service of one another, as well as in our suffering and humiliation. It is the time of his continuing presence, but also the time of his continuing judgement, because his presence searches us. So, the coming of Christ includes not only his birth and his Second Coming, but also his continuing presence with us throughout all the time in between. 'Behold, I am with you always, until the end of time' (Matthew 28. 20).

But there is more to it even than this. At his trial, Jesus said: 'You will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven'. In Scripture, 'cloud' is a sign of God's presence. The Israelites in the desert had the pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night, as a sign of God's presence with them. And when Jesus was transfigured on the mountain, the terrified apostles were overshadowed by a cloud, and they feared when they entered it, the fear of awe in God's presence. So, to speak of the Son of Man on the clouds of heaven, is to speak of Jesus sharing fully in the Godhead.

These words about the Son of Man on the clouds are quotations from the Old Testament. The Prophet Daniel sees a vision of the Ancient of Days, God himself, seated on his throne. Then Daniel sees 'one like a son of man coming with the clouds of heaven. And he came to the Ancient of Days and was presented before him. To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, so that all peoples, nations and languages should serve him' (Daniel 7: 13-14).

So, this 'coming of the Son of Man' is not a coming to earth, to us. It is a coming to the Ancient of Days, to God the Father, an ascent rather than a descent. A man, Jesus, is raised to the throne of God himself, sharing his glory. And if one man, then all men; for, as Daniel's prophecy goes on to say, the Son of Man is linked with the 'saints of the Most High'. So not only the Son of Man, but also the Saints of the Most High, will share the glory and dominion and majesty of God.

This is the vision which is offered us, a vision by which we live, which gives us hope and strength and direction in the present, whatever confusion and agony we may suffer. The prayer of the first generation of Christians is ours as well: 'Maranatha', 'Come Lord Jesus'.
