POPE FRANCIS SPEAKS TO US

VALUES AND LOVE FOR THE POOR

This is a time to recover values, in the proper sense of the word: to return to what is authentically worthwhile. The value of life, of nature, of the dignity of the person, of work, of relationship – all these are values key to human life, which cannot be traded away or sacrificed. It amazes me when I hear people talk of "non-negotiable values." All true values, human values are non-negotiable. Can I say which of the fingers on my hand has more value than the others? If it is of value, it has a value that cannot be negotiated.

Jesus gave us a set of key words with which he summed up the grammar of the Kingdom of God: the Beatitudes. They begin in the hope of the poor for fullness of life, for peace and fraternity, for equity and justice. It is an order of existence in which values are not negotiated but sacrosanct. Reflecting on the Kingdom of God, in response to the way we live in the modern world, the Church has developed a series of principles for reflection, together with criteria for judgement that also offer directives for action. It is known as Catholic Social Teaching (CST). While they are drawn from reflection on the Gospel, its principles are accessible to all, seeking to translate and set in motion the Good News in the here and now.

The criteria are truly expressions of love, that is, they seek to set in motion

dynamics that allow people to feel loved, especially the poor, who are able to experience their true value. When the Church talks of *the preferential option of the poor*, it means that we need always to keep in mind how any decision we make might impact the poor. But it also means we need to put the poor at the center of our thinking. By means of that preferential option, the Lord gives us a new perspective on value with which to judge events.

Similarly, when the Church speaks of *the common good*, it asks us to have regard for the good of society as a whole. It is not enough to adjudicate between different parties and interests, or think in terms of the greatest happiness of the greatest number, as if the interests of the majority trump all other interests. The common good is the good we all share in, the good of the people as a whole, as well as the goods we hold in common that should be for all. When we invest in the common good, we amplify what is good for all.

Another principle of social teaching is *the universal destination of goods*. God meant the goods of the earth for all. Private property is a right, but its use and regulation need to keep in mind this key principle. The goods of life – land, lodging and labour – should be made available to all. This is not altruism, or goodwill; it is what love demands. The early Church fathers made clear that giving to the poor is just giving back to them what is theirs, for God intended the goods of the earth for all, without excluding anyone.

The temperature should be warmer going into spring, and we had already started the process of looking at a replacement system which should help. More information will be given as we have it.
