The Feast of the Presentation of our Lord

Nowadays we do not use words related to *sacrifice*, such as *offering* or *oblation* outside liturgy. Even the word *victim* has lost its original positive meaning of *something that we offer*. Most of us hear that word used in the expression: a victim of violence. When we come to Holy Mass, we hear after the preparation of the gifts: *Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, Almighty Father*.

However, perhaps we are somewhat disturbed by the whole idea of offering sacrifice, as it has become a taboo for many of us. We think of it as something less civilised, generally we avoid the word altogether, even when we talk about Mass. Sacrifice is something they did long ago somewhere on a pacific island, slaughtering chickens behind their huts. It has nothing to do with us. But sacrifice is at the centre of our faith as it is indeed at the centre of every Mass.

From a faith viewpoint, *Sacrifice* comes from the Latin *sacer-facere*, to make holy. Sacrifice means making whatever it is that you offer (victim), the domain of God. To offer a sacrifice means to set something aside for God and this is how our redemption came about. In Christ's sacrifice on the cross, his humanity becomes part of what is offered to God or made holy and is thus restored to God, reversing the Fall.

The Letter to the Hebrews is absolutely central to our understanding of the Sacrifice of Mass. The letter speaks of Christ as High Priest of the New and Eternal Covenant. His sacrifice on the cross is once and for all, and it does not have to be repeated. Why? Because that sacrifice was perfect in every way unlike other sacrifices which needed repeating. For God there is no

time; this sacrifice of Christ is for all eternity and that very sacrifice is made present in Mass, in a bloodless way. Of course, sacrifices have been offered to gods, idols or spirits from the very beginning of the human race and was also very important to the Jews. The whole of Jewish religion was centred on the Temple in Jerusalem and sacrifices were being offered there all the time.

We can say, then, that all those sacrifices were pointing towards the one sacrifice of Christ. God has chosen to redeem us in a way that we would all understand. There must be so many different ways in which God could have redeemed us, yet he chose to redeem us using our nature, using the things that we do and understand.

This is why Simeon and Anna rejoice at seeing the Light of the Gentiles and the glory of Israel. All the sacrifices of the world, whether Jewish or Gentile, point towards the one of Christ. We ourselves are invited to offer our lives as a living sacrifice to God. Let us not be afraid to do so, for offering our lives to God is a sure way of preserving them for the world to come.
